Master gardeners will train others

The Extension Master Gardener Program, sponsored by K-State Research and Extension, trains and certifies volunteers in horticulture and related areas.

Master gardeners, in turn, volunteer their expertise and services to help others through horticulture projects that benefit the community. Once trained, extension master gar-

deners provide researched-based information to the public on many topics, including, water conservation, yard waste management, regional plant adaptability, landscape maintenance, tree and lawn maintenance, environmental issues and several other topics. Master gardeners work with the extension staff to develop educational programs that meet the horticultural needs of their citizens. These may include school programs, demonstration gardens, educational programs, a speaker's bureau and answering questions on a horticultural hot line.

Program requirements are that the first year, after receiving the basic training, master gardeners are to return 40 hours of service time on projects that benefit the community and events sponsored by their county extension office. Active participation is a commitment each is asked to make to the program. After the first year, master gardeners are asked to volunteer 20 hours and continue their education

with eight hours of advanced training. A master gardener training course will be starting up soon. The first train-
