Varsity Cowboys kill off Buffaloes

The Goodland Daily News Goodland fans walked away with smiles after the varsity Cowboys slammed the Atwood Buffaloes 75-51 Friday night at Max Jones Fieldhouse.

Playing right after the Cowgirls had revved up the crowd with an overtime game, the boys had a lot to live up to. There might not have been as much nail-biting tension, but judging by the roars, the crowd didn't seem to mind. Donald Raymer started out doing what seems to be his specialty, getting an offensive rebound and laying it in for two, giving Goodland the lead.

The Buffaloes came back with a good fade-away shot by Jess Holmes, tying it up. This is as close as Atwood came all night.

The Cowboys dominated the first quarter, scoring 20 and holding the smaller Class 2A school to 10.

The Buffaloes tried to bridge the gap in the second quarter, outscoring Goodland by a point, the only quarter they would.

The end of the half gave proof that high school basketball doesn't have a shot clock. The Cowboys held on the ball for a minute and a half, almost looking as if they were playing keep away on the playground. Every player had the ball at least twice, looking for an opening, but Atwood's defense wouldn't give.

With the crowd getting impatient and Goodland coach Jon McLean on his feet shouting instruction, Andrew Melia finally posted up and took a shot with three seconds left, only to be fouled. He made one of two free shots, putting Goodland up 34-25 at the half.

Two minutes into the second half, Goodland's Aaron Gittinger scored

two three-pointers, raising the lead to 13, and forcing the Buffaloes to take a time-out. It didn't do any good. On the next play, Raymer posted up, and put the lead at 15.

With 45 seconds in the third, Melia got the rebound of his own shot and scored. Atwood's Nate Woodrow came back with a trey, ending the quarter at 52-38.

The Buffaloes tried to hold the Cowboys in the fourth, chasing after loose balls and applying a full-court presses.

With two minutes left, and Goodland up 71-48, the Cowboy starters got a rest and the rest of the team got a chance to play.


Jared Doke scored the last four points for Goodland, two from foul shots, and two from an assist by Alan Cebula. Atwood's Brady Fuller scored a long three-pointer, but by this time it was more for practice than any chance to get back in the game.

Raymer led Goodland with 19 points, 7 rebounds. Gittinger had 18 points, and Melia 14. Kris Rubio, while not shooting well, did grab eight rebounds, three steals, and four assists. Coach Jon McLean said he was pleased with the team's performance.

'We played well on defense," he said, "and offensively we get better every game."

The win puts the Cowboys record at -5. Their next game will be against McCook at 7:45 Mountain Time at the Orange and Black Basketball Classic in Colby at Colby High School gym. McLean said McCook has a 10-1 record, and they will be a tough opponent.
