# obituaries

Marion Parker Marion C. Parker, 93, of Goodland

died Tuesday at the Goodland Regional Medical Center.

He was born May 11, 1908 at Colorado Springs, the son of Alzina Lenore (Braden) and Moses Clark Parker. In 1914, the family moved to Goodland

He graduated from Sherman County High School in 1926, having been voted "wittiest" in his class. He married his high school sweetheart Betty Geisenhoner in 1929.

He worked for the Rock Island Railroad as a fireman, an engineer and a road foreman and was an engineer on the last Rocky Mountain Rocket out of Denver. He served six years as Kansas State Legislative Representative for the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers before retiring in 1973.

He spent many years collecting and preserving the history of Sherman County, and was the first president of the Sherman County Historical Society in 1975. He gave many talks and slide shows on the history of the county to school children and to local service clubs.

Parker served as a city commissioner from 1978-81, and in 1989 received the Chamber of Commerce Community Service Award. He contributed a large collection of pictures with information about Sherman County to the Kansas State Historical Society. He also contributed much information on the Rock Island Railroad to books written by Tom Lee of Clay Center. He was a member of the Goodland Masonic Bodies and the Isis Shrine.

Marion and Betty were honored at the all-school reunion in August for their many contributions to the community.

Preceding him in death were his parents, a brother, Harold Parker, and a nephew, Jerry Parker.

Survivors include his wife; a son, Bob (Billie) Parker of Chicago; two grandchildren; and four great grandchildren.

Services will be held at 10 a.m. Saturday at Koons Chapel in Goodland with burial following at the Goodland Cemetery. Reader Stephanie Brock will officiate.

She moved to Naples, Fla., in 1997, where she lived with her granddaughter Camille. She was a member of the First Baptist Church in Naples and of the Sons of Hermann Irby Lodge #241. She returned to Sherman County to run the harvest office every July.

publican leaders want to look for potential cost savings, a Senate committee plans to review eligibility rules for social services.

Gov. Bill Graves and many legislators believe the state must add nearly \$120 million to cover unanticipated costs in services for the poor, elderly and disabled. The extra expenses are part of a projected \$426 million gap between expected revenues and spending commitments for the state's 2003 fiscal year, which begins July 1.

On Wednesday, officials of the departments of Aging and Social and Rehabilitation Services briefed the Senate Ways and Means Committee about the cost increases.

Chairman Steve Morris asked Aging and SRS officials to give the committee a report on the eligibility requirements for their programs. He said the

TOPEKA(AP) - Because two Re- committee will review those requirements to see whether any of them should be changed.

Morris, R-Hugoton, has the support of Senate President Dave Kerr, R-Hutchinson, who serves on the committee. Kerr acknowledged that savings will be difficult to find.

'They won't be low-hanging fruit," Kerr said.

Sen. Christine Downey, D-Newton, another committee member, said she's not opposed to reviewing programs and the eligibility rules but said it would be irresponsible for the state to make getting services harder.
