

Burnitz returns and joins a lineup with newcomers Roberto Alomar, Mo Vaughn and Roger

They got two minor leaguers from Colorado: infielder-outfielder Ross Gload and pitcher Craig House.

He has Aeneas Williams to thank for

Williams was the highest-profile addition to a St. Louis Rams defense that has been so revitalized it ranked third in the NFL this season. Not only has the All-Pro cornerback become a central figure on that unit, but he's helped an offense that already was the most prolific in pro football.

"It's fun facing Aeneas," Holt, the Rams' leading receiver, said Monday. "He's a challenge. He puts his hands on you well, he can still run, he plays the ball like a receiver. He gets you ready. If you go up against Aeneas and win ing one for a score. Kim Herring and some battles, you come out of that day feeling good."

Everyone on the Rams' vastly improved defense is feeling pretty good after a 45-17 rout of the Green Bay Packers in which St. Louis had six interceptions and recovered two fumbles. Williams, who will turn 34 during Super Bowl week, ran back two in eight new starters, including Willinterceptions for touchdowns, an NFL playoff first.

That's the kind of stuff the Rams have come to expect from Williams, who spent a decade losing in Arizona. That merely heightened his thirst for

"This feels great," Williams said of being a victory over Philadelphia away from the Super Bowl. "It's been a journey. Alot of times in life, you just need opportunities. What this organization has done for us as players is give us a tremendous opportunity to succeed."
