'Jurassic Park' display at Sternberg Museum HAYS (AP) — A dinosaur never

before seen in North America is among the highlights of a prehistoric animal display at the Sternberg Museum of Natural History.

The display, called "Jurassic Park: The Life and Death of Dinosaurs," opened Saturday and continues through May 5. The exhibit includes mounted skel-

etons and fleshed-out sculptures and props used to make the box-office hit movies, including the velociraptor, the 80-foot long-neck mamenchisaurus and the "spitter" dinosaur, dilopho-

Tom Conarty

1928-2002

Tom Conarty was born the 12th of May 1928 to Paul and Nettie Swift Conarty. He was the youngest of six children. He had two brothers, Clyde and Dave, sisters Addie and Edith who preceded him in death. Surviving is his sister, Alice. He was a western Kansas farmer and rancher. We know the farm as the 101 Ranch. They always said it was because there was always one hundred and one things that needed to be done all the time. He grew wheat, corn, sugar beets and some sunflowers and raised and fed cattle.

He learned to fly and became a licensed pilot. He liked going to the races. He even owned his own racehorse. He took trips to the mountains to hunt big game like deer and elk. He even shot a mountain lion once. He loved to go hunting. There was always pheasants, ducks, rabbits, or maybe a coyote on the farm and later years deer. He has been known to go fishing down on Goose Creek and stream fishing up in the mountains where he and his brother had a cabin. They took 4 wheel drives on every trail around the cabin and enjoyed the mountain scenery. He liked to snowmobile up there.

Nieces and nephews were always welcome at his home and they all have great memories of their times spent with him, such as family dinners on holidays and birthdays. Who could forget the big card games after eating. We'll always remember the Family Reunion in 1987 celebrating the 50 years on the 101.

He became a big fan of the Broncos and someone was usually around to watch the Super Bowl with him every year. He would always find someone to make a bet with and probably won more than he lost because he would always let you pick who you thought would win. He watched all kinds of sports on

television when he got sick. He liked to watch game shows, especially Jeopardy.

He traveled a lot after he quit working so hard. When his brother was gone he found a special lady, Marie, to share his life with and they were married in Las Vegas in August 1988

surrounded by his nieces and nephews. He was finally a couple and they had a good time traveling. Then in the spring of 1989 they decided to move from the farm into Goodland where they bought a home. They had a beautiful yard of flowers and roses and he took care of the yard as long as he was able. Marie suffered a stroke in 1992 and left Tom alone once again.

His declining health problems made him rethink his living arrangements and when Wheat Ridge Acres opened up down the street he decided it was time to move and sell the house. He liked his home there and the care he received. He died there in the evening of January
