either build something, complete an experiment or answer questions. He said some categories require students to build entries before the competition.

Jace Chipperfield and Bill Linin placed first in Physics Lab, which requires students to complete a number of laboratory tasks.

Jordan Riebel and Darin Richardson placed first in Dynamic Planet, where teams work at stations that display a variety of earth science materials and related earth science questions.

Josh Topliff and Sam Kear placed

first in Robot Ramble, in which students design and build a robot capable of performing certain tasks.

Riebel and Rebecca Gattshall placed first in Wright Stuff, in which students design and build a propeller "aerodynamic device" for greatest time aloft. Amy Anderson and Brian Coon placed first in Cell Biology, in which contestants answer questions on cell structures and functions.

Teams that placed second included Richardson and Alyssa Mason, Cow-A-Bungee; Anderson and Kayla Rasure, WriteIt-Dolt; Chipperfield and Coon, Scrambler; and Matt Hall, Linin

and Richardson, Experimental Design.

Third places included Rasure and Kear, From a Distance; and Chipperfield and Riebel, Practical Data Gathering.

Fourth-place finishers included Hall and Topliff, Chemistry Lab; Rasure, Gattshall and Topliff, Mission Possible; Coon and Mandy Bellamy, Water Quality; Bellamy and Gattshall, Rocks and Minerals; and Coon and Megan Leonard, Feathered Frenzy.

Other events the team participated in included Boomilever, Sounds of Music, Disease Detective, Reach for the Stars and Polymer Detectives.
