## Cowboys win two on weekend sweep

The Goodland Daily News The Goodland High School Cowboys came out of this weekend with a sweep, bringing their record to 9-10 by beating the Hoxie Indians 80-68 on Friday and Wray Eagles 68-56 on Sat-

The boys have a chance to even up their record when they play the last game of the regular season against Norton at 7 p.m. Tuesday at Max Jones Fieldhouse.

On Saturday, aside from the first few minutes of the game, Goodland led the whole time. Goodland came up with the tip and the first points when Don Raymer got a feed from Andrew Melia and missed his first attempt, but got his own rebound and put the ball back in for two. Wray had a brief 4-2 lead a minute into the game, and the Eagle's Luke Orr tied it up at six points a minute later, but after the first quarter, it was all Goodland all the time.

The first quarter ended with the Cowboys up 20-17. At the start of the second, Gittinger drove through the Eagle defenders but missed the lay-in. Bryan Mai got the rebound and the putback to put Goodland up by 5. After a bucket by Wray, the Cowboys racked up four straight, to put them up 26-19.

With three minutes left in the half,. Raymer came up with back-to-back baskets, one off of a feed from Aaron Gittinger, the other from Melia, who had been posted up inside.

The first half ended with a flurry of activity. Jordan Riebel knocked a Wray inbound pass off of an Eagle defender. The Cowboys got the ball down to the other end of the court, and Riebel missed a three-pointer with four seconds left. Wray got the rebound, but Melia stole it and put up a shot at the buzzer, which missed, ending the half with Goodland leading 37-29.


The Cowboys led by 13 with two minutes left in the quarter and the Eagles missed back-to-back threepoint attempts. Bowman was fouled by Gittinger with 31 seconds left and made both free throws, but Goodland came back, with Melia laying it in with an assist from Mai to end the quarter

In the fourth quarter, the teams traded baskets and Goodland put in some of its junior varsity players. Alan Cebula came up with a steal with a minute and a half left, and Bill Linen was set up for a nice inside lay-in with 39 seconds left, but he lost control of the ball and knocked it out of bounds.

Wray scored 5 points in the last 10 seconds, a lay-in by Chartier, and a three pointer by Tim Crow, but it was too little to do any good, and the Cowboys walked away with a 12-point victory. Melia and Raymer led scoring with 23 each. Mai had 8, Lance Tedford 5, Kevin Schulte 4, Gittinger and Riebel 2.

During the game on Friday, Goodland outscored the Indians in every guarter. The Cowbovs scored 21 to Hoxie's 19 in the first and the second quarters, to put them up 42-38. Goodland came up with 13 in the third to Hoxie's 12, and bested them by seven in the fourth, 25-18.

At state last year, Blayze Bahe placed fourth in the 103-pound weight class, and Bryce Bahe took second at 130 pounds. Schulte and Saint qualified for state last year. Bryce Bahe took sixth in the state his freshman year and placed second when he was a sopho-


