sports Cowgirls beat Blue Jays; will face them again

The Goodland Daily News With a solid win Tuesday over the Norton Lady Blue Jays, 69-43, the Goodland Cowgirls finished the regular season with a 15-5 record.

They will host the Norton Lady Blue Jays at Max Jones Fieldhouse at 6 p.m. Monday in the quarter-finals of the sub-state tournament.

"I can't say enough about the way the girls played," said a happy Cowgirl Coach Connie Livengood. "We passed well, shot well and rebounded well.

"We played team ball tonight. We did a good job of looking for the mismatch. When we are passing like that it is almost unstoppable," she said.

"I was a little worried in the first three minutes of the third quarter when we let them outscore us 10-2," Livengood said. "Then we took off and really got hot. It was fantastic. We played well Saturday night and tonight."

Looking to the rematch with Norton on Monday, Livengood said, "I expect to see a different team than we saw tonight. I think they were a little flat, and maybe some of the girls may not have been up to full strength.

'Norton has done well when they get hot, but tonight we were hot," she said. "Monday it will be for all the marbles because only the winner goes on."

The Cowgirls found themselves down early as Abbey Keiswetter hit the first of two three-point shots to give the Lady Blue Jays the lead.

Goodland's first point of the game was a free throw by Lacey Brenner at the 7:38 mark. Erica Mann hit two baskets in quick succession to tie the score and give the Cowgirls the lead 5-3 with 4:41 left.

Afoul on Mann gave Norton's Lindsay Hager a chance for a three-point bounds.

play to retake the lead 6-5 with 4:30 scorer for the Lady Blue Jays with 20 points and nine in the first quarter.

The Lady Blue Jays were playing a spread sort of offense with lots of long passes, and then they would get Hager open inside for a quick shot.

StevieLee Raymer retook the lead for the Cowgirls on two free throws. Raymer had four of her 14 points in the first quarter. Anny McCoy extended the Cowgirls' lead to five points on two free throws and a field goal with 2:10 left. McCoy had 14 points for the night.

With one minute left, Jessica Osborn got a steal and took it the length of the floor for a jump shot and the final Cowgirl points of the quarter to lead, 15-10. Osborn had 10 points on the night.

The first quarter ended with the Cowgirls leading 15-14. At the start of the second quarter there was some furious action with the ball moving quickly from end to end, but there was no scoring. The ball was tied up under the Goodland basket and the jump ball arrow was in Norton's favor, but moments later the ball was tied up under the Norton basket and went back to Goodland.

Jayci Stone broke the scoring drought with her first basket at the 6:40 mark. Stone had 10 points for the night including two three-point baskets in the third quarter to spark the Cowgirls. She had nine rebounds and nine assists plus two steals.

The Cowgirls had run up a 51-34 lead at the end of the quarter. In the fourth, the Cowgirls outscored the Lady Blue Jays, 18-9.

With six minutes left, Coach Livengood put Jessica Vignery in, and Stephanie Fairbanks a couple of minutes later. Vignery hit one of two free throws with 3:35 remaining to make it 65-39.

Tess Schultz and Kendra Billinger came in with two minutes left.

Vignery hit the final basket for the Cowgirls with 15 seconds left to make the score 69-43. She got a steal a few seconds later, but the basket at the buzzer was waived off by the referee. Fairbanks had one assist, and

The Cowboys worked themselves down court and Derrick Raymer let a jump-shot fly. It got the bounce off the rim and put the Cowboys back up with four seconds left. Wilkens ended the game and secured a Cowboy win by making both of his free throws.

The Cowgirls came out ahead of their contest 32-27. They outscored the Lady Eagles 10-4 in the first quarter, and ended up ahead 16-10 at the half. They came up with eight points in the third, compared to Wray's 7, and scored eight in the fourth while holding the Lady Eagles to three.

Goodland shot 40 percent from the free throw line, making eight out of 20, and Wray shot 62 percent, making eight out of 13.

He said the first round match will be a good game.


"It will be an even match," McLean said. "We match up with Ulysses well. We'll have to play well to win.




