Schilling calls Colorado Rockies centerfielder Juan Pierre one of the two centage of .979 and committed only best leadoff hitters in the National one error in his last 49 games.

Rockies hitting coach Clint Hurdle calls Pierre the hardest-working player he has ever coached.

In his first full big-league season in 2001, the 24-year-old proved he was no longer just a scrawny kid with a big heart. The Rockies gave him the center

field job that year with reservations. After a call-up from the minors, Pierre had hit .310 in the final two months of the 2000 season, but could he do it over a full season? Would his defense be adequate? Could he improve as a bunter and basestealer?

Pierre answered a resounding yes to every question.

He played in 156 games, finished ninth in the NL with a .327 batting average and second in the league with 202

He tied Philadelphia's Jimmy Rollins for most stolen bases in the NL (46), and he stole third base 14 times, tying Seattle's Ichiro Suzuki for most in the maiors.

He averaged a strikeout once every 23.6 plate appearances, the best ratio in the majors, and he led the NL with 51 infield hits. He also tied a club record with 11 triples.


