Cowboys fall from sub-state in overtime loss

The Goodland Daily News The buzzer-beater missed, and the season is over. The varsity Cowboys lost in overtime to the Scott City Beavers 57-55, in the sub-state semi-finals Friday in Pratt.

With Goodland down by five points and 20 seconds left, Kris Rubio came up with a three-pointer. Scott City tried to bring the ball down court, but faced full-court defense from Kevin Schulte, and Rubio managed to tie up the ball. The Cowboys got the ball under the alternate possession rule with 13 seconds left.

They got it down court through the Beaver defense, but had the ball knocked away on a pass. Bryan Mai picked it up off the floor and, surrounded by Scott City defenders and with time running out, put up a short jumper. It missed.


The loss finished off Goodland's season record at 10-12. It was the last game for three Cowboys, seniors Jordan Riebel, Mai and Andrew Melia.

"All three of them did a great job this year," said Coach Jon McLean. "We will miss them. I am proud of the way they have developed as players.

"We have a good group of core players coming back next year, with some good varsity experience, and they'll have the same opportunities. It just depends on how hard they want to work to improve their individual

The game was tight throughout. Goodland led the first quarter 13-12, the second 22-21, and Scott City brought it even in the third at 38, and the fourth at 52.

Aaron Gittinger put the Cowboys into overtime with a three-pointer which tied it up at 52 points. Scott City ended up passing right to the Cowboys as time ran out.

Judge awards damages

dence presented that they knew she was on the verge of death or that Christina was "abused or terrorized," as Lake's lawyer said during the trial.

The judge said Res-Care did not financially benefit from the death because Lake never paid the company. But, he said, there was evidence that Golden West was understaffed and employees weren't properly trained.

Christina's death, he said, adding that condition and called her doctor.

Judge Reid said he saw no credible proof that Golden West tried to conceal evidence or deliberately alter or destroy Christina's medical records to avoid punishment. He said the company never admitted it did anything wrong, punished any employees or changed any policies after the death. In the five years before Christina's

death, the order said, Res-Care had a net revenue ranging between \$77 million and \$171 million. Judge Reid said economist Dr. William Terrell testified during a punitive damages hearing in September that a large award is necessary to effectively punish Res-Care.

The judge said the only other damages Res-Care would be paying are the \$104,223 in actual damages. The company faces no criminal penalties for the death. After an investigation, the judge said, the Kansas Department of Health and Environment did require Res-Care to change some procedures, although there was no evidence that happened.

Judge Reid found Zellner was a vulnerable target because she was developmentally disabled, with an IQ between 51 and 58.

The judge said Golden West staff's negligence caused Christina's death, but he noted that the plaintiff's lawyers did not prove that the company broke any laws and should face criminal pen-
