Padres beat out **Rockies**

PEORIA, Ariz. (AP) — Rookie Sean Burroughs was 2-for-3 with a booming home run — his first of the spring — two RBIs and two runs scored to lead the San Diego Padres over a Colorado Rockies split squad 7-4 Monday.

Burroughs, 21, will start at third base this year, forcing All-Star Phil Nevin to shift to first base and All-Star Ryan Klesko to go to right field.

Burroughs is batting .435 (10-for-23) with five runs and seven RBIs.

The left-hander pulled an 0-2 pitch from right-hander Denny Stark well beyond the left-field fence while leading off the second inning.

Burroughs scored again in the third inning as San Diego scored four runs to push the lead to 5-0.

Stark yielded four hits, including an RBI double by former Rockies outfielder Ron Gant, before Burroughs greeted reliever Cam Esslinger with a single up the middle to drive home Gant with the Padres' last run of the inning

Stark, the loser, allowed four runs, five hits and a walk in 22-3 innings. He struck out one. Winner Brett Tomko pitched three scoreless innings, allowing four hits and a walk while hitting one batter and striking out two.

Colorado closed to 5-4 by scoring twice in the fourth and fifth innings against right-hander Dennis Tankersley.

Juan Pierre had a two-run triple in the fourth, and Greg Norton led off the fifth with a home run to right field. With two outs in the fifth, Mike Bell singled, stole second base and scored on a single by Tony Eusebio for the Rockies' final run. Norton finished 2-

Williams' passion spurs him to win

Associated Press Writer KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — This might be the year that Roy Williams stills his critics' mantra. You know how it goes: "He's a good coach, but ... '

Then again, maybe it isn't No. 2 Kansas' year to win its first national title since 1988.

Either way, Williams said, he isn't worried what other people think. His own drive, what he called his "passion" for a national title, is more than enough to motivate him.

If that passion goes unrequited for another year, he can live with that too.

"I do have passion for it. I'm not hesitant to say that," Williams said Monday, during the conference call of the Big 12's NCAA-bound coaches. "Some of my buddies tell me I set myself up for failure, because it's just so made only seven field goals in the first hard to do. Every year, only one coach is going to do it.

"To say that I'm driven, yes, I'm driven to do that," he said. "To say that I'm a maniac, that it's the only way I'm going to judge my worth — that's far from the truth. I've said publicly that I've had 13 great, great years with kids that I've really, truly loved."

That hasn't stopped the questions for Williams, whose Jayhawks are seeded No. 1 in the NCAA's Midwest Regional despite losing the Big 12 tour- loss might be good for us - to refuel nament championship game 64-55 to No. 3 Oklahoma on Sunday.

"The media, the fans ... keep asking me that question: 'Are you the best coach never to have won it?" he said.

Williams doesn't have an answer for them.

"I think it's sort of flattering to be considered one of the best coaches in any category, even if it's just a category of two people," he said. "I try not to get too caught up in that.'

Kansas' string of NCAA tournament bids dates to 1990, Williams' second season. But after a runner-up finish in 1992 and a Final Four appearance in 1994, the Jayhawks have played in only one regional final, in 1996.

"I think we do a great job, and yet we haven't won a national championship in 13 years," Williams said. "There's some pretty doggone good coaches and coaching staffs that haven't."

Kansas (29-3) went unbeaten through the 16-game Big 12 season and won 18 straight games against conference opponents before Sunday's loss.

Against the Sooners, the Jayhawks half and shot just 33 percent (19-for-57) from the field. All-Big 12 guard Kirk Hinrich went 0-for-10 from the field and had just four points.

"He will not brush that off," Williams said. "He's a serious-minded kid, and this will just make him more motivated."

Forward Drew Gooden dismissed suggestions that the Jayhawks needed a loss to refocus them.

"A lot of people are trying to say a or rejuvenate us," said Gooden, the Big 12 player of the year. "You can say it if you want, but this team knows what we are capable of doing. We are capable of being a Final Four team and a national championship team, but we just have to put it together and do it.'

Turnovers and free throws were the team's Achilles' heels. They lost the ball 411 times during the season, compared to 341 for the teams they played, and they shot 220-382, about 58 percent, from the free-throw line, opposed to 66 percent

Rural Recycler

This is the first of what I hope will be a series of articles about Rural Recycling in Eastern Colorado and Western Kansas.

Those of us who have been associated with voluntary public recycling have been aware that one of the most important things we can do to increase recycling is continuing education of the public about recycling issues and advantages. This point was brought home vividly to me recently when a Lady I work with heard me on the radio talking about the recycling program and then asked me several questions about the program the next day.

Although she had seen the recycling containers around the City for a number of years, she had never known what could be put in the bins to be recycled and what preparations had to be made to the recycled materials. I was kind of surprised at her questions since over the previous 10 years we had written a number of articles and sent out many news releases about the program. It dawned on me that we need to continue to provide that information so that people who had missed it previously might see it this time. Here then is some information about the Southeast and East Central Recycling Association Program

The SE&EC Recycling Association is a non-profit Corporation made up of the Counties, Cities and Towns that it services. It is operated by a Board of Directors made up of one member from each County in the program. It is a voluntary drop-off program and has been in continuous operation since June 1992.

The SE&EC Recycling Program is currently the largest, in terms of geographical area, in the U.S. We cover just over. 40,000 square miles of Eastern Colorado and Western Kansas. We currently operate in 13 Counties in Colorado. They are Baca, Bent, Cheyenne, Crowley, Elbert, El Paso, Huerfano, Kiowa, Kit Carson, Las Animas, Lincoln, Otero, and Prowers. We also service Sherman County Kan. The program has 64 sites at which there are one or more drop-off con-
