

## Houseplants may need to be repotted after growth

As outdoor plants break dormancy and start to grow in response to the longer days and warmer temperatures of spring, house plants usually put on a spurt of growth. Eventually, these indoor plants out-

grow their containers and need to be To check if your plants are becom-

ing root bound and need a larger pot, inspect the root system. First, knock the plant out of its pot. Watering several hours before this operation will allow the plant to be removed more easily. On pots that are eight inches in di-

ameter or less, place one hand over the top of the pot with the stem of the plant passing between two fingers and turn the plant upside down. Then rap the edge of the pot against a table. The root ball should come away from the pot.

On pots that are more than eight inches in diameter, a bit more encouragement may be needed. Place the pot pot with a rubber mallet. Turn the plant pot to ensure this. This mix will need than one year.


