## Stanley Gorlinsky

Stanley D. Gorlinsky, 90, who installed appliances for Caldwell’s and did farm work, died Sunday, March 17, 2002, at the Good Samaritan Center in Goodland.

He was born Jan. 12, 1912, in Hartford, Ark., the son of Lila (Bowman) and Carl Gorlinsky. He attended school at Russellville, Ark., and, after completing his education, moved to Sherman County and worked for the Pizel farms.

He married Mildred Weeden on Feb. 24, 1936, at the Methodist Church in Goodland. He was an installation technician for Caldwell’s, an appliance store, in Goodland before he retired at 65. He later worked part-time in the summer

for Irvin Farms, where he had worked for over 10 years before working at Caldwell’s.
