Looks like crabgrass time

The good news is: we're beginning to see signs of spring. The bad news is: that means it's time to start thinking about spring weed control again, particularly crabgrass.

Does it matter when you put down your crabgrass preventer this spring? You bet it does, if you want good results.

Crabgrass preventers are a family of pre-emergence herbicides that prevent young crabgrass plants from emerging from of the ground.

Because effective control prevents crabgrass from popping out of the ground, and because some advertisers falsely say so, many folks are led to believe that these herbicides keep the seed from germinating. Not so. Rather, the germinating plant encounters the herbicide in the soil as it tries to emerge from the ground and is killed.

This scenario is actually more beneficial than if these herbicides prevented germination because a germinated seed is no longer viable and can't cause future problems. With few exceptions, crabgrass preventers have no effect on existing crabgrass plants. They also have a limited "shelf life" once applied to the soil.

Microorganisms and warm temperatures in the soil gradually begin to break crabgrass preventers down soon after they are applied. In fact, many crabgrass preventers are ineffective after about 60 days (although length of control varies considerably among products).



For most of Kansas, crabgrass typically begins to germinate around May 1. Applying crabgrass preventer with a short shelf life too early can cause it to lose some of its potency by the time it is needed. With many materials, a follow-up application may be needed six to eight weeks later. This will depend on which product you use, so

check the label to be sure. Barricade and Dimension are two products that can be used earlier in the year and will still give season-long control of crabgrass. Barricade can be applied in the fall for crabgrass control the next season. It should be applied in fall when used on a fertilizer carrier.

Dimension is unique in that it can be applied after the crabgrass has germinated, as long as the plants are still small. And for all you procrastinators, Dimension can be applied through early May with very good results.

Both products have longer residual activity than other crabgrass preventers. This means two things: you can apply these herbicides early in the spring and they won't require followup applications like other products.

Most years, April 1-15 is a good time carefully.

to apply the preventer. This allows sufficient time for the herbicide to evenly spread and form an effective barrier in the soil before crabgrass germination starts.

Weather varies from one spring to the next and affects when crabgrass begins to germinate. For this reason, application timing for crabgrass preventers is sometimes based on the bloom of ornamental plants.

The Eastern redbud tree has been a traditional model to use: when the trees in your area are approaching fullbloom, apply your crabgrass preventer. If there aren't red buds in your area, or you are unsure about using this method, an oil thermometer is the best way to predict crabgrass germination.

Crabgrass germinates when soil temperatures reach 55 degrees. Soil thermometers can be purchased for minimal cost at most garden stores and are also useful for timing garden plantings.

If you hire a company to apply crabgrass preventer, make sure to ask a few questions: which material they are using, the length of control you can expect from the application, and whether they plan to reapply at an appropriate later date.

Remember, when using pesticides, read the label and follow instructions




