Mentzer took eighth in singles competition at the state tournament last year, while the team placed 11th at state and finished fourth in sub-state competition

Though this year's team has some growing to do, McKee said it will help that a bunch of students decided to participate.

"The numbers are good this year," he said. "Much better than last year."
