Stalking makes victims fear for safety

Stalking — it can make you live in fear.

Stalking is a series of acts by another person that harass you and make you fear for your safety. A stalker often tries to control a person by keeping him or her in a state of constant fear.

Stalking is all too common. Most victims are women, but men and children can be stalked as well. It happens to people of all racial and ethnic groups.

People stalk others for different reasons. The stalker may be someone with whom you shared your life, a former or current boyfriend, girlfriend or spouse.

The person may start stalking to keep you in a relationship that you have ended or are trying to end, or to "get even" with you for leaving or rejecting him or her. The latter is the most common kind of stalker. Most often, the person was abusive during the relationship. A stalker can also be a casual acquaintance or a complete stranger. This may be an obsessed admirer who wants e-mail. to be in a relationship with you. The attention may flatter you at first — until the person won't take no for an answer. Stalking often follows a pattern. It may start with unwanted attention. The person may keep trying to be a part of your life, even after you tell him or her to leave you alone. The person may keep calling or leaving messages and sending unwanted letters, e-mail or gifts. The stalker may follow you of-



place uninvited or spy on you.

It can become more dangerous. Over time, the stalker may increase the harassment and put you in danger.
