Sorority to honor 40 at Founder's Day meal

The Goodland chapters of Beta Sigma Phi will honor 40 of its members when they hold their annual Founder's Day dinner at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday at Sugar Hills Country Club.

The sorority will hold a ritual ceremony honoring three members for 50 years of service, 15 25-year members, and 12 will get the Order of the Rose, an honorary degree for women who have served the sorority and the public for 15 years.

The society was started in 1931 in Kansas by Walter W. Ross, according to the Beta Sigma Phi website, to give women a chance to get involved in social and cultural activities they otherwise might not have been able to.

During World War II, members

raised \$22 million to buy war bonds. Today there are over 200,000 members all over the world.

The sorority gives women a chance to form friendships and socialize with each other, said Marti Scott, president of the Exempt chapter, and to help support cultural events in Goodland, such as the Arts Center.

There are about 60 to 70 members in five Goodland chapters, Scott said, and about 55 will be at the dinner. The chapters are loosely based on age, although the women are allowed to move from one to another.

Membership is by invitation only, but if a woman is interested in joining, Scott said, she should talk to a sorority sister.

Senate raises court filing fees

TOPEKA (AP) — Two weeks after the state Supreme Court raised filing fees to deal with its budget problems, the Senate advanced a bill raising the fees even more.

The bill, which received first-round approval on a voice vote Thursday, would raise \$200,000 for the Kansas Law Enforcement Training Center in Hutchinson and \$280,000 for the Judicial Council.

If approved on a final vote set for Friday, the fee bill would return to the House, which has already passed a different version.

Gov. Bill Graves' proposed budget for the fiscal year that starts July 1 included no money for the Judicial Council, which reviews criminal and civil codes for legislators and the Supreme Court.

A Senate's debate Thursday came as the controversy quieted over the Supreme Court's order to impose fee increases without seeking legislative approval.

House gives aid to schools

TOPEKA (AP) — The House has tentatively approved a bill granting local school boards more authority and providing more state aid to districts with declining enrollments.

Members advanced the bill to final action on an 84-34 vote Thursday, with final action set for Friday.

The bill had support in the House despite a prediction from Education Committee Chairman Ralph Tanner that more local control would spawn a "black hole of mischief."

The bill states that a local board "shall have the power to transact business for the efficient and effective use of district resources in a manner and upon such terms and conditions as the

board deems to be in the best interest of the school district."

Current law requires that boards ask legislators for grants of specific powers, such as the authority to enter into agreements with other districts to provide services.

The local control provision was added to a bill making it easier for school districts to use contingency funds for general education purposes. Currently, boards can only use the funds in emergencies with approval from the State Board of Education.
