Queen Mother Elizabeth dead at age 101

LONDON — The coffin of the Queen Mother Elizabeth rested today in a small stone chapel at Windsor Castle where the royal family privately mourned the beloved matriarch before she is taken to lie in state in London.

Troops in a dozen locations around the country and in the colony of Gibraltar brought out ceremonial cannons to fire 41-gun salutes in honor of King George VI's widow, who died at her Windsor home Saturday afternoon at the age of 101.

Flags flew at half-staff and thousands of admirers of the enduringly popular former queen signed condolence books that were opened Sunday at royal palaces and homes around the

Bouquets of bright spring flowers, with fond messages attached, were placed at St. James's Palace and the adjacent Clarence House, which had been the Queen Mother's London home since her husband's death in 1952 and the accession of her daughter, Queen Elizabeth II.

University of Kansas, Sandidge has turned his fascination into a doctoral project. Sandidge is researching the fiddle-backed brown recluse. "People definitely have a reason to

be afraid of them," Sandidge said. "People might think I'm crazy searching in damp, dark places for spiders that could injure you.' Sandidge wants to know why one

house can have hundreds of spiders while the house next door has none.

"Almost every house I've been in, I've seen a sign of a brown recluse being there, having been there or being the type of environment where they would live," he said.

Many spider studies focus on bites and venom. But Sandidge plans to research the spiders' mating habits to determine how or if populations in different locations mingle.

"People have studied many things about the spider, but they haven't studied the spider," he said. "Most people are looking at the effect. I'm looking


