Yes, it may be true that alcohol is one of their few pleasures left, but let's look at this — does alcohol cause more pain than pleasure?

We have all heard remarks like this: "My husband or wife can't be an alcoholic." "Alcoholics are poor, don't have jobs, can't handle it or are just

That is the perception many people have of alcoholics or people who might develop alcoholism. Many are totally unaware that alcoholism is an equal opportunity disease which affects rich as well as poor, the successful as well as the unsuccessful.

It is estimated that as many as two million people over the age of 60 may

age, there are many people who are affected by the older person's drinking.

Family and friends are hurt but sometimes react by saying, "Why get help? He will never stop drinking any-

The truth is that family and friends can play and important role in helping older drinkers by motivating them to get the help they need.

Yes, alcoholism is preventable and treatable. The first step is to become educated ourselves. The more we understand alcoholism and its stages, the more we will be able to help.

Early detection of an alcohol prob-

vention of drinking problems among older people is possible with help from family and friends, the community and older people themselves.

Elderly people are highly susceptible to alcohol's effect. As people get older, their bodies take longer to process alcohol. A 30-year-old may feel little effect from two drinks. At age 60, the same amount of alcohol will have a much more intoxicating effect.

Serious damage to health may also occur quickly in elderly drinkers. Older people are frequent users of prescription and non-prescription medications. Combining alcohol and certain drugs can dangerously and tragically multiply the effects of these sub-

Elderly drinkers may be:

•early-onset alcoholics — people who begin drinking early in life and survive beyond middle age despite any medical problems caused by alcohol.

•late-onset alcoholics — people who begin drinking heavily later in life usually because of a dramatic change such as retirement or the loss of a loved one.

Most elderly drinkers are not alcoholics, but, if alcohol interferes with daily life or relationships, it is time to
