Meth a highly addictive stimulant

Methamphetamine is a synthetic nervous stimulant. It can be snorted, injected or swallowed. It can produce a high that can last up to 16 hours, is highly addictive and can produce severe withdrawals.

Meth was first discovered in Japan in 1919, and amphetamine was synthesized in Germany in 1887. In the 1940s. it was given to soldiers and factory workers in World War II for heightened physical and mental performance.

In the '50s, it was legally manufactured and taken by college students, truck drivers and athletes who also used it for physical and mental perfor-

In the '60s, it was prescribed for weight loss. In the '70s, it was distributed by motorcycle gangs in California. In the '90s, there was an epidemic of use due in part to availability of the recipe on the Internet.

In Fiscal Year 2000, Kansas Meth **Treatment Facts:**

• Out of all people seeking drug treatment, meth accounted for 7 percent. • 55.1 percent of meth addicts were

male, 44 percent female.

• 95 percent of meth addicts were caucasian.

• 48.5 percent of treatment was outpatient.

• Treatment for meth addicts focuses

on cognitive behavioral interventions. • A "wall" period lasts 6-8 months

during which the brain recovers from changes. There are three methods of meth

1. Phenyl-2-proponone, which is not used anymore due the need for more time, space, materials and heat. It requires 3-4 "cooking" days.

2. Red phosphorous method, in which heat is not needed, is common in the southwest and Mexico. Requires 4-6 "cooking" hours.

3. "Nazi" method, is more common in Kansas; it produces 100 percent meth and requires only 2 hours of cook-

ing time. Lithium batteries, anhydrous ammonia and sodium are most often used in this method. A hundred dollars worth of supplies can make about \$1,000 worth of meth. One person who cooks meth can train 10 cooks.

The cost of a meth lab cleanup are very costly —\$1,265,807 was spent by federal agencies alone in 2000 to clean up 238 meth labs in Kansas (approximately \$5,318 per lab). This does not include local law enforcement ex-

Meth makers will dig holes in the ground to throw away waste, making it flammable. Every pound of methamphetamine produced in a clandestine laboratory leaves behind 5-6 pounds of toxic waste, and must be cleaned up properly.

Meth labs can be set up in homes, apartments, rental properties, hotels/ motels, vacant buildings, farm fields, wooded areas, barns, garages, cars, trailers or storage units. Landlords and property owners are responsible for clean up costs and possibly for any damages to other tenants and neighbors. There are three meth cleanup waste sites in Kansas.

The Midwest High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area, which targets anything that has to do with meth, was founded in 1996 due the increase of meth use and cooking. What can we do to help?

Spot a meth lab:

- Unusual strong odors.
- Unusual numbers of chemical con-
- · Windows blacked out or covered. Secretive or protected area.
- Little or no mail, furniture, visible trash or newspaper delivery.
- · Smaller trailer or building with running generator. • Excessive water usage.

contents are usually already pre-measured. According to a few former drug users these needles work best to hide 'track marks' made clearly visible by a "regular" needle. Q - County Employees were also concerned about coming in contact with some of this toxic waste and what kind of symptoms should they be

aware of to know if they have? A - Because working in a landfill opens the doors to many germs, symptoms can be similar to common ailments such as the flu and may be difficult to tell. The best advice is to use universal precautions (hand washing, gloves, remove shoes and, if possible, clothing in the garage before going into your home, and do not touch anyone or
