The junior varsity will travel to Russell on Tuesday for a meet. The varsity tennis team will play in Scott City on Saturday and will have a home meet on Thursday.



In the girls' bracket, Hagerman finished first in the high hurdles, running the course in 15.6 seconds, and grabbed second in the intermediate hurdles with 46.6 on the stopwatch. She jumped 15 feet, 1.25 inches in the long jump to earn third.

Billinger was the first to the string in the 3,200-meter run with a time of 13 minutes, 16.9 seconds. She ran the 1600 meters in 6 minutes, 7.4 seconds to earn third.
