DENVER (AP) — Peter Forsberg old Peter." hoped the fans would remember him after sitting out for nearly a year.

He should have known better. Forsberg had two assists in his return and Greg de Vries made his first playoff goal a game-winner as the defending Stanley Cup champion Colorado Avalanche opened the series with a 4-3 victory over the Los Angeles Kings on Thursday night.

The crowd rose and waved towels when Forsberg entered during a timeout 1:23 into the game, then started a chant of "Peter! Peter!" once play resumed. They got even louder on Forsberg's first assist, even though he was back near the red line when the goal was scored.

"It was great," Forsberg said. "I didn't know how it's going to be and I was real nervous before the game. It feels great. At least they remembered me, that was a good thing.'

Forsberg has shown a knack for coming up big after a layoff.

He had a goal and two assists last year after missing eight games because of a rib injury, and had two goals and three assists after missing the first 23 games the year before because of shoulder surgery.

"Very impressive for a guy who didn't play for basically a year," Colorado coach Bob Hartley said. "The best a pass near the Colorado blue line. thing he did was that he looked for shy away, and he played like the good first.

Strange year ends for Denver Nuggets

The Associated Press DENVER (AP) — Mike Evans has spent 20 years in the NBA as player,

television analyst and coach. His last one may have been the strangest. Evans got his big break in the 2001-

02 season when he was named Denver's interim coach in December. But he also had to endure as many hardships as some coaches face in five years. "It was a little bit of everything,"

Evans said. "All the drama you could have, we had this year. It was tedious, it was joyful, it was satisfying. It was all those things.'

All-Star forward Antonio McDyess due to knee surgery and lost four of its first five games. Point guard Nick Van Exel began making almost daily demands to be traded, then coach Dan Issel resigned

in December after making racial remarks to a Hispanic fan. The Nuggets rid themselves of Van Exel's complaining with a sevenplayer deal with Dallas at the trade deadline, but it also cost them center Raef LaFrentz and led to a league-high

34 different starting lineups. McDyess returned March 1, but played just 10 games because his knee was sore.

Tim Hardaway provided some stability at point guard after the trade with Dallas, but was suspended for throwing a television onto the court and sat out the final 14 games with a broken

rebounder Juwan Howard to a strained groin after he slipped without being hit, and all-purpose player George McCloud suffered a corneal abrasion after taking an elbow from Golden State's Danny Fortson. The Nuggets finished 27-55 and

missed the playoffs for the seventh straight year, but Evans said it was a good experience overall.

come a lot closer as a team," Evans of experience down the stretch. The said. "The guys are a lot more relaxed, they feel better about themselves and they have a better feeling about me and what I'm about. It's been really good."

By holding the team together and keeping it competitive through the turmoil, Evans may have given himself a good shot at becoming Denver's next

Denver general manager Kiki Vandeweghe said he will take some time before naming for a new coach, but he hopes to have one in place by the NBA draft June 26.

Evans will be one of the candidates for the job.

"It's never an ideal situation and obviously this hasn't been an ideal situation for any of us," Vandeweghe said "It's been very difficult. You tend to make the best of the opportunities and Denver opened the season without I think this has been a tremendous opportunity for him."

Whether Evans becomes the Nuggets next coach or not, he's shown that he can coach in the NBA.

Denver finished just 18-38 under Evans, but the record doesn't reflect the progress the Nuggets made over the final two months of the season. The Nuggets' players responded to

Evans' easygoing style and played hard for him nearly every night. There were occasional slip-ups -

consecutive losses to Washington and Sacramento by a combined 68 points in March — but the Nuggets did their best to impact the playoffs down the stretch. Of Denver's final 15 victories, seven

were against teams in playoff contention. The list includes the defending champion Los Angeles Lakers, Seattle Utah, Minnesota and Portland twice. "There were times where we maybe Denver also lost leading scorer and didn't need to have practice, but he (Evans) would have us out there prac-

ticing," Denver forward Ryan Bowen

said. "That showed us that we're not

quitting on the season. He was a big

part of keeping us motivated and getting us ready each night we played." And the Nuggets did it with a roster filled mostly with first- and secondyear players.
