

Coffeyville to hold junior bowl game

COFFEYVILLE (AP) — A junior college football bowl game will return to Coffeyville in December.

The first Dalton Defenders Bowl will be played Sunday, Dec. 1, at Veterans Memorial Stadium. The bowl was sanctioned by the National Junior College Athletic Association Board of Directors at its annual meeting earlier this month.

The host team will be one of the top three teams from the Jayhawk Conference. The visiting team will be an at-large team chosen by its final poll standings and fan appeal.

Organizers say the Dalton Defenders Bowl may occasionally be a national championship game based on the strength of the Jayhawk Conference. Garden City, Butler County and Coffeyville have been among the top three national teams nearly every year, with Hutchinson and Fort Scott also

making strong showings.

"I think this conference is going to do nothing but get better," said Leroy Alsup, Coffeyville city manager and a founding member of the bowl committee. "There is going to be ample opportunity to have a national championship game."

The bowl game will be operated by a bowl committee under the auspices of the Coffeyville Community Enhancement Foundation, a non-profit group created by the city of Coffeyville.

Coffeyville played host to the Jayhawk Bowl from 1983 to 1988.

Funds for the game will come primarily from corporate and individual sponsorships. Initial sponsors will be asked to commit to five years so the bowl game can establish itself. The bowl budget is expected to be \$50,000 annually.

Women's U.S. Open boasts record prize

HUTCHINSON (AP) — The U.S. Women's Open Championship in July will have a record purse of \$3 million, U.S. Golf Association officials said.

The purse was originally going to be the same \$2.9 million as last year, but USGA official Cora Jane Blanchard announced Monday that an additional \$100,000 in prize money had been added.

The winner will receive a prize of \$535,000.

"It's a milestone in women's golf," said Betse Hamilton, the USGA's

women's championship director. "It's by far the largest payoff on the LPGA Tour. Sometimes people look at prize money. We want to show that women's golf has importance."

Meanwhile, Australian Karrie Webb, who hopes to make golf history by becoming the first woman to win three Opens in a row, said she knew what she had to do leading up to the July 4-7 tournament when she saw the golf course from her airplane as she came into Hutchinson.

"We flew over the golf course and I

already knew with the lack of trees that the rough would be high and that the wind would blow," Webb said.

"Without looking at the course, I know what I'm working on the next 10 weeks."

Still, Webb said she would not play at the Prairie Dunes Country Club until July 1.

"It's not something I've ever done. I've never played a course in advance of a tournament week," Webb said. "You try not to get any preconceived notions. Even if I played it today, it's

never going to be like that that during tournament week."

Webb is the sixth two-time defending U.S. Women's Open champion, but no one has captured three of the contests in a row.

"I'll try not to let the 'three-peat' overwhelm me too much," Webb said. "I'll focus on trying to win it like I've never won it before. Doing well doesn't necessarily mean that you're going to win every year. Giving myself a chance to win it is what my goal is at the start of the week."

Tight end joins Chiefs

ORONO, Maine (AP) — University of Maine tight end Chad Hayes of Old Town has agreed to terms with the Kansas City Chiefs of the National Football League, the university announced Monday.

The 6-foot-6, 260-pound Hayes, who set season records in all categories for a tight end during the regular football season, worked out with eight teams in the month leading up to the NFL draft.

Hayes had predicted that even if he wasn't drafted this past weekend, he would have a free-agent offer by Sunday night. He plans to have a future in professional football one way or another, it seems.

Hayes has long been a favorite at the stadiums at which he plays, and has been known to draw the eyes of the girls.

"His best football is in front of him. You can bet the NFL scouts know that," Maine Coach Jack Cosgrove said before the draft had ended.

Hayes made 39 catches for 510 yards

and nine touchdowns in 12 games in his senior season at Maine, helping the team to earn a berth in the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs.

The Black Bears beat McNeese State 14-10 in the first round and lost to Northern Iowa 56-28 in the quarterfinals. Maine finished 9-3.

The 23-year-old fifth-year senior was also on the All-Atlantic 10 first team, and was named second team All-American by The Sports Network, The Associated Press and Dan Hansen's Football Gazette.

In the Gridiron Classic, an annual all-star game in Florida, Hayes caught touchdown passes of 4, 46 and 3 yards and was named the game's most valuable offensive player.

During his regular season career at Maine, the tight end made 70 catches which put him 883 yards down the field and scoring nine touchdowns for the team.
