## Charley Raile

Charley H. Raile, 80, a former city worker, died Monday, April 22, 2002, at the Goodland Regional Medical Center.

He was born June 8, 1921, in Cheyenne County, the son of Magdalen (Miller) and Jacob Raile. Along with his four brothers and four sisters, he was raised on a farm southwest of St. Francis and attended Battlecreek School.

He served in the Army during World War II, from 1942-46. On Sept. 15, 1948, he married Dolores Mumm in Burlington. They lived in St. Francis

for 18 years, where he was a serviceman for Caldwell's and later the caretaker of the St. Francis Cemetery.

The family moved to Goodland in 1965, where he worked for the city until retiring in 1983. Even after retiring, he continued to mow lawns.

He was a member of the Lutheran Church, the Goodland Elks Lodge and the Veterans of Foreign Wars. He never met a stranger and enjoyed sharing coffee and good times with friends.

Preceding him in death were his parents; three brothers, Dav, Theodore and William Raile; and two sisters, Louise Walz and Katie Kuplack.

Survivors include his wife; four daughters, Diana (Dwight) Nelson of Wichita, Charlene (Wes) Spillman of Hoxie, Karen (Paul) Finegan of Boulder, Colo., and Colleen (Tom) Hill of Colby; two sisters, Magdalene Paxton of Goodland and Marie D. (George)

Challis of Denver; a brother, Calvin (Dolores) Raile of St. Francis; three sisters-in-law, Sylvia Raile and Thelma Raile of St. Francis and Hulda Raile of Madison, Neb.; nine grandchildren; and a great-grandson.

Services will be at 9:30 a.m. Friday, April 26, 2002, at the Koons Chapel in Goodland with Pastor Scott Grimshaw officiating. Burial will follow in the St. Francis Cemetery.
