Congressional remapping stuck in joint committee

TOPEKA(AP)—Legislative negotiators are toiling over new lines for the state's four U.S. House districts.

How to treat the city of Lawrence and whether to put parts or all of Riley and Geary Counties in the 1st District were the major points of contention as a House-Senate conference committee met twice to try and reconcile differences on congressional redistricting.

Boundaries of legislative, Board of Education and U.S. House districts needed revision this year to account for shifts in population during the 1990s.

New maps of the Board of Education and Kansas House districts are now complete, and the Supreme Court is expected to rule soon on whether the Kansas Senate map passes constitutional muster.

That leaves lawmakers still laboring over the U.S. House map.

who is the only Democrat in Kansas congressional delegation.

Sen. Anthony Hensley, D-Topeka, and Rep. Troy Findley, D-Lawrence, conceded that splitting the city would be more palatable than placing it entirely in the 2nd District.

Hensley said Lawrence officials' second choice, after being kept whole in the 3rd District, would be to keep the University of Kansas in the 3rd and put the rest of the city in the 2nd District. He added: "Last — and it's way down the list — is to be placed completely in 2nd."

Both Hensley and Findley made it clear that they couldn't support a map that split the city or placed it in the 2nd. But GOP negotiators pressed forward with their plans and hoped to reach an agreement Wednesday. But they still weren't sure they had a map that would meet all criteria.

"We all have deal breakers, and we treated the city of Lawrence and Riley all have positions and preferences," said Sen David Adkins R-Leawood "I don't know if finding a compromise is even possible.'

House negotiators wanted to put Geary County in the 1st District, currently represented by Republican Jerry Moran. But the Senate members preferred leaving it in its current district the 2nd, which is represented by Republican Jim Ryun.

Research bill heads to governor

bonds to build three university research centers and improve a fourth has gone to Gov. Bill Graves.

"I give the Legislature credit for having the courage to make a bold move at this time," said Kim Wilcox, president and chief executive officer for the Board of Regents, which oversees the higher education system.

The measure, approved on a 101-23 House vote Tuesday, would permit the state to issue \$133 million in bonds.

Operation of the new centers would be funded from federal research grants.
