# Early May is a good time to raise mowing heights

So far, we've been able to mow lawns pretty low — 2 to 2.5 inches for fescue, 1.5 to 2 inches for bluegrass. Mowing at these heights is great for early spring because it helps thicken lawns and removes dead growth from the previous season. 2 of Sec. 2 and the N/2 of Sec. 3 in

But now is the time to raise mowing heights to the maximum end of the scale: 3.5 inches for fescue, 2.5 inches for bluegrass. This change in early May helps promote the development of roots as summer approaches, especially if it coincides with the K-State recommended use of fertilizer at this time of year.
