Six Sherman County students won \$465 scholarships to attend the Future Astronaut program this summer at the Kansas Cosmosphere and Space Center in Hutchinson.


The winners were picked from 14 applicants on May 8. Goodland civic organizations, businesses and individuals donated money for the schol-
