Steroids and supplements are not foreword for his book

Bonds has grown weary of suspicions that chemicals have helped him transform his body in recent years and given him the extra power to hit 73 homers last season and 15 so far this

He has denied using steroids and said tests would show he's clean. Of course, baseball has no drug tests, so people will just have to take Bonds' word for it. Or not.

Bonds has an upper torso that looks six sizes larger than the one he had just a few years ago. The bulging veins on his biceps look like fat worms. Even his shaved scalp seems to ripple with

He says that's all from fierce workoffseason. Maybe so. More to the point, does it matter?

Unlike the Olympics, the NCAA, pro football and several other sports, baseball has no rules against steroids. The players' association won't stand for drug tests and the owners aren't pushing for them. It's not in either side's economic interest to stop players from bulking up to hit more hom-
