

Detroit to counter offense with offense

DENVER (AP) — Detroit coach Scotty Bowman has a simple approach to counteract the high-scoring lines of the Colorado Avalanche: more offense by the Red Wings.

Colorado's top two lines have combined for seven goals and seven assists as the Avalanche split the first two games of the Western Conference finals in Detroit.

But instead of clamping down on defense as the series shifts to Denver on Wednesday night, Bowman wants his top lines to turn up the offensive pressure.

"We have to improve our own attack," Bowman said Tuesday. "That's the best way to do it — try to put a little more pressure on them. They're playing four defensemen for the most part and you would maybe want to try to play a little more on the attack."

To do that, Bowman will have to spur his top players. Brendan Shanahan, Monday night, which gave the Ava-Steve Yzerman and Sergei Federov lanche a 4-3 victory over Detroit and combined for 11 goals and 24 assists home-ice advantage in the best-ofin the first two rounds against seven series, was just the latest in what yet to score against Colorado and has had few good opportunities.
