although they might be able to understand her, they weren't always happy to see her and her group of Americans.

"People could be grouchy, especially if we couldn't speak any of the language," Cole said. "Italy was bad. We were trying to make reservations to get home, and no one would admit to understanding us."

On her way back to the United States, Cole said she was accosted by a drunk woman on a train.

"She said I was stupid because I am an American," she said.

"She asked if I had voted for Bush, because he is an idiot. She was not a nice woman."

Cole headed back to Baylor on Saturday for summer classes.

While in Europe, she said she took the opportunity to see the sights.

She saw the Eiffel Tower, Notre

Dame Cathedral, the El Prado Museum in Spain, and a class project took her to a display of Vincent Van Gogh's paintings, including the original of the giant sunflower painting in Goodland.

"It looked just the same," she said, "just not as big."

While traveling, she stayed at hostels, which were cheaper than hotels, ranging from eight to 20 euros a night. Cole said a euro, the new common currency on the continent, is worth about the same as a dollar.

Some of the hostels were like dormitories and had rooms with 20 beds, she said, and some charged by the minute to use the shower.

They were filled with travelers from Europe, North America and some Australians.

"We talked to each other, asked each other what we had seen, what was worth looking at," she said. "We learned a lot from each other."

Israeli's security cabinet pondering response

JERUSALEM — Israel's security Cabinet today weighed a response to a rash of Palestinian attacks that killed six Israelis over two days, including three teen-agers gunned down while playing basketball in a Jewish settlement in the West Bank.

With the upsurge of bombings and shootings, Prime Minister Ariel Sharon was under growing pressure

from his public to take decisive action against Palestinian militants. However, the Cabinet's options appeared limited.

In Tuesday night's attack, a Palestinian gunman shot and killed three teen-agers — two 17-year-olds and a 14-year-old — at an Orthodox Jewish boarding school in the West Bank settlement of Itamar, near the Palestinian city of Nablus.

by September, mostly specialists in computers, foreign languages and sciences.

"We have to do a much better job at recruiting, managing and training our work force," Mueller said. "We have to do a better job of collaborating with others. We have to do a better job of

collecting, analyzing and sharing information."

Ashcroft expressed confidence in Mueller's ability to see the agency through this historic transformation. "Bob Mueller is the right man for that job.... This reformer will overhaul the FBI," he said.

Other priorities for the reorganized FBI, Mueller said, will be preventing

high technology crimes, combating public corruption, protecting the civil rights of Americans, battling national and international criminal organizations, combating major white collar crimes and violent crimes.

In advance of Wednesday's announcement, Sen. Arlen Specter, R-Pa., had predicted that congressional hearings next week on the reorganiza-

tion plan will focus on the bureau's handling of the warning last June from its Phoenix office about an inordinate number of Arabs attending flight training schools in the United States.

The bureau also will have to answer questions about a letter from a Minnesota FBI agent angry about failed efforts to win permission to search the computer of Zacarias Moussaoui in.

Campaign contributor wants money returned

TOPEKA — The state's largest electric company wants House Speaker Kent Glasscock to return a \$2,000 contribution because he is running with Wichita Mayor Bob Knight in the Republican governor's race.

Glasscock was the lieutenant governor candidate on Attorney General Carla Stovall's ticket until she dropped out of the GOP race in April. Last week, Glasscock took the No. 2 spot on Knight's ticket.

After Stovall abandoned her campaign, the state Governmental Ethics Commission ruled that Glasscock was entitled to take much of the money raised by the team with him.

In a letter to Glasscock that it released Tuesday, Westar Energy said it no longer felt its contribution would be

used to benefit a candidate for governor that the utility could support.

"In our experience, Bob Knight's leadership style is one that is divisive and expensive for taxpayers and ratepayers. We don't believe his approach is good for Kansas," wrote Doug Lawrence, Westar's vice president for public affairs.

Knight said returning the money is no problem. He added that he would have given it back even if Westar had not asked.

"I have zero in common with the management of Western Resources," Knight said, referring to Westar's parent company, based in Topeka. "I have not and will not be intimidated by their leadership."

"I don't want their money. I'm not for sale."

Knight said he expected other donors would request that their contributions be returned, but not with the same voracity as Westar.

"I don't think this is going to be typical," Knight said.

Glasscock transferred a sizable balance from the former Stovall campaign to the Knight ticket. Glasscock has avoided saying how much, only describing the funds as "a bunch."

The letter from Westar was dated May 22, two days after Knight named Glasscock his lieutenant governor candidate. Lawrence wrote Glasscock that he was "disturbed and disappointed" by the House speaker's decision to join the Knight ticket.

Westar also contributed \$2,000 to State Treasurer Tim Shallenburger's and Insurance Commissioner Kathleen Sebelius' gubernatorial campaigns. Shallenburger is a Republican and Sebelius, a Democrat.
