Sebelius introduces aircraft executive as running mate in governor's race

Associated Press Writer TOPEKA — Insurance Commissioner Kathleen Sebelius introduced Wichita aircraft executive John Moore today as her running mate in the governor's race.

Sebelius is the only announced Democratic candidate, and Moore would be her choice for lieutenant governor after switching his party registration from Republican to Democrat less than three weeks ago.

Moore had agreed to join her ticket The Knight ticket lured her former runinto the Democratic Party.

But State GOP Chairman Mark Parkinson called Sebelius' choice a "gimmick" designed to hide what he said were her liberal politics. "Clearly, she's worried about her
