Cellular outage a mystery

Two phone companies blame each other for mistake

Two telephone companies blamed each other for a problem which kept people from reaching many cellular customers in western Kansas earlier this week.

A spokesperson for Alltel, a cell phone company, says a Southwestern Bell mistake stopped people here from being able to reach cell phones earlier this week. A Bell representative said there was no problem on their end, however.

On Wednesday, many people in Goodland and Colby reported not being able to reach cell phone numbers from a land line. They said after they dialed, they heard a message saying something like, "This call can not be completed, please hang up and dial again.'

The problem was cleared up Thursday morning, but no one seemed to be sure what happened or how it was fixed.

Dwain Hebda, a spokesperson for Alltel in Little Rock, Ark., said a Bell technician told an Alltel technician there was a problem with a Bell switch. He said Bell told Alltel about the problem because it would affect Alltel customers.

Hebda said it affected callers in Colby, Goodland, Hays and Ellinsworth, making the prefixes 821, 443, 531 and 635 inaccessible from a land line

Bonita, a Southwestern representative who wouldn't give her whole name, said a "trouble report" filed on PLAIN SENSE, Consultation and Wednesday said Southwestern technicians couldn't find anything wrong on their end.

House leader joins insurance race

Associated Press Writer TOPEKA — House Minority Leader Jim Garner is running for insurance commissioner on incumbent Kathleen Sebelius' record.

The top Democrat in the House, Garner launched his campaign Thursday by promising to continue the legacy of Sebelius, a Democrat who is running for governor after two terms as commissioner. He said Sebelius took an out-of-touch bureaucracy and made it a consumer friendly office.

Garner also promised not to take contributions from insurance companies and other entities regulated by the Commissioners.

Insurance Department, in keeping with a practice Sebelius adopted when she first ran in 1994. Republican and some Democratic candidates have taken industry contributions.

"If your campaign is heavily funded by the industry, you cannot be an independent commissioner," Garner said during a Statehouse rally. "We must not go back.'

Garner criticized a candidate for the Republican nomination, Sen. Sandy Praeger, of Lawrence, noting that she has a fund-raiser scheduled for Sunday in Philadelphia during a convention of the National Association of Insurance
