

Goodland struggles in extra inning

Goodland came back to tie Colby in the sixth and go into extra innings in an American Legion game Monday, but gave up 10 runs in the eighth and ended up losing 16-9.

The Goodland team lost to Colby on Saturday 9-4.

On Monday at Memorial Park, neither team scored until the third inning. Colby managed to load the bases with no outs, then hit a grounder to the second baseman. The infielder threw home too late, and the runner scored.

The first out of the inning was a foul pop fly to Andrew Melia at first. The next batter hit a grounder to shortstop, who threw it to first, but the ball went wild, and two runners scored, leaving runners on second and third.

The next batter hit a weak grounder to Landon West, the pitcher, and was thrown out at first, but the runner on third managed to score. The throw to home from first went wild, and the next runner scored, too, bringing the total to 5.

Goodland got its first run when Kyle Schulte stole home. Schulte had gotten on base by a walk, and the ball went wild when the Colby pitcher tried to pick him off. The Goodland High School junior got to third before the ball could be retrieved.

The pitcher faked a pickoff attempt at third, and Schulte took off for home.

He dodged around the catcher and was able to bring the score to 5-1.

Goodland came up with two runs in the fourth. West got on base with a walk, and ended up on third when Keith Vasquez hit a single to right field. The next batter struck out, and Jace Terry got a grounder past the shortstop, allowing both runners to score, and bringing the game to 5-3.

Two more Goodland players score in the sixth. Jake Johnson batted in the

first run, driving Brock Lohr with a hit to shallow right field. The Colby pitcher balked, allowing the runner on third, Terry, to score and tying the game at 5.

Goodland switched pitchers in the seventh inning. Melia took over the mound and Aaron Gittinger went into the lineup for West in right.

Melia walked the first two batters on 10 pitches. The next batter hit the ball to short, and the runner from first was

forced out at second. The runner from second scored when the throw to first went wild. The next batter grounded out, then a Colby man went down swinging.

Goodland's Matt Kuhlman walked on four pitches, then got to second after Vasquez grounded out. A wild pitch allowed him to steal third. Lohr got a single with a hit to right field and Kuhlman scored. Terry was hit by a pitch, putting runners on first and sec-

ond. Jared Duke came to bat, swing and missing the first two pitches. He let the next one go by for a ball, then swung, missing and sending the game to extra innings.

Two Colby batters struck out before the team scored 10 runs in the inning.

A Colby batter hit to left, bringing in a runner who had been walked. The relay throw to home came late. After another walk, a Colby batter hit a double, bringing home another runner for a score of 8-6. Melia hit the next batter with a pitch, then walked the next two, allowing two runs.

Vasquez came up from third base to take over the mound and Melia went back to first. Vasquez walked the next three batters, and a runner stole home on a wild pitch. A hit to right cleared the bases and brought in three runs, bringing the game to 16-6. Vasquez was able to strike out the next batter to end that part of the inning.

Johnson and Kyle Schulte drew walks, then Kevin Schulte hit the ball to right and Johnson headed for home. The throw from the outfield came in time, but the catcher was knocked down by Johnson and lost the ball. The Schulte brothers both scored later in the inning, to bring the score to 16-9.

Goodland next plays St. Francis at 5 p.m. Wednesday at Goodland Memorial field. Goodland won their last contest 23-3 after 2 1/2 innings. The game was called under the mercy rule.

Kids learn soccer tips at clinic

The British are coming, and Goodland kids will get the chance to learn something from them.

The Goodland Activities Center is bringing in professional soccer players from Great Britain from June 24 to 28 to give a camp for kids 4 to 14.

The coaches are from Challenge Sports, an organization which sends players all over the country to build interest in soccer. Over 350 clinics are set up every year.

"Americans find it very difficult to find quality coaches," one of the coaches said last year. "In Europe, we have very strict discipline and coaches so hopefully we can help teach young kids proper techniques."

The kids are split into groups by age. The youngest are taught basic skills, like passing and dribbling. Older kids are taught more advanced skills, such as the proper way to throw a ball in-bounds, and complex dribbling skills.

How many groups the kids are split into depends on how many sign up for the camp, said Donna Terry, administrator of the center. Last year, there were three groups, she said, and one year there were four.

The coaches will stay with the families of some of the kids in the camp, and those kids will get a discount on the program.

The camp costs \$89 to attend. Kids can sign up for it up to the day it starts, Terry said, but there is a \$10 late fee after June 14.

The camp will be at North Elementary School from 8:30 to 9:30 a.m. for kids 4 and 5-year old, and 8 to 11 a.m. for older kids.

Rockies lose to Red Sox 7-3

BOSTON (AP)—The Rockies lost an inter-league game with the Boston Red Sox on Monday, giving the opposing AL pitcher 10 wins.

Derek Lowe isn't getting excited about being the first pitcher to reach that mark.

"It's just a number," he said after beating the Colorado Rockies 7-3. "I mean, the year doesn't stop right now. There's a long way to go. At the end of the year, if you're leading the league in wins, maybe that is something."

Lowe (10-2) gave up solo homers to Todd Zeile and Bobby Estalella—the first home runs he has allowed in 108 innings.

In all, Lowe gave up two runs on a season-high eight hits, striking out three and walking none in six innings.

It was the 10th time in 13 starts that Lowe allowed two or fewer runs. His ERA rose from 1.81 to 1.89—still the best in the AL.

Tim Wakefield pitched three innings for his third save, and Boston won for the first time in interleague play this year, having been swept by Arizona over the weekend. The Red Sox have

the best record in baseball at 41-20, but they're just 16-14 at home.

Colorado was swept in three games by Toronto over the weekend and has lost seven of eight. Denny Neagle (4-3), who was 3-0 on the road this year, was charged with six runs in five innings on nine hits and four walks and a hit batter. He struck out four.

Brian Daubach homered as Boston pounded Neagle with six consecutive hits to score three runs in the fourth and two in the fifth to take a 6-1 lead.

Daubach had an RBI single to make it 1-0 in the first. Jason Varitek and Trot Nixon walked to put two on with two outs in the fourth before Lou Merloni

and Johnny Damon each hit RBI singles.

Jose Offerman followed with a line drive to right that drew a throw from Todd Hollandsworth. Merloni appeared to get a large part of the plate with his left foot and elude Estalella's tag, but umpire Jeff Nelson made no ruling.

Estalella then tagged Merloni, who was called out.

Things didn't go much better for Neagle in the fifth, though. Nomar Garciaparra led off with a double, and Daubach hit a 400-foot homer to straightaway center for his ninth homer of the year.

After Frankenfeld leaves, Thomas said, there will be Tiede, owner of Mitch Tiede Terracing, and Kevin Rasure, owner of Rasure Lumber Do-it Center in Goodland. He said having a farmer on the commission would provide a good balance and allow the officials to fairly represent everyone in Goodland and Sherman County.

Thomas, who said he has never held an elected position before, said he thinks the commissioners have done an excellent job, and he'd like to join the team.

"I want to help them continue what they're doing," he said, adding that he has no specific goals.

Thomas said he and his wife Jan, who owns A Moment in Time photography, moved here from Wisconsin almost six years ago. They decided to come to Kansas, he said, because urban development in Wisconsin was squeezing farmers in.

The couple has three children Adam, 24, who works for Barker Farm Services; Tristan, 20, who works for Hawkeye Spraying Service and runs his own harvesting business; and Tiffany, 14, who will be a freshman in high school next year.

Reid, who has lived in Sherman County for 47 years, also said he thinks the commissioners are on the right track and he wants to help keep them there.

"I want to contribute to this good effort and will do my best to do what is good for Sherman County and its citizens," he said.

Reid has been active in an effort to form a new economic development group for Sherman County and was named chairman of the new agency by board members last week.

Those who have filed include Ron Vignery, Ward 4; Elmer and Joyce Purvis, McPherson; Keith and Judith Coon, Voltaire; Allen and Doris Quenzer, Union; Harlan and Cora House, Itasca; Marlyn Mangus, Ward 1; Roxie Yonkey, Ward 3; Christie Rasure, Democrat, Logan; Barbara Eisenbart, Logan; Lois Cossman, Grant; Dixie Chatfield, Ward 2; and Jeff Mason, Ward 1.

The only race is for the county committee position in Voltaire, where Carol Gattshall will be running against Judith Coon.

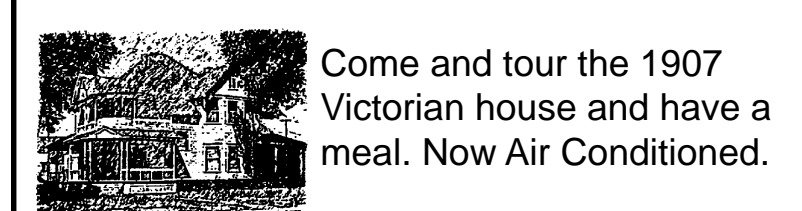
