COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo (AP) — Robby Unser is officially entered in the 80th Pikes Peak International Hill Climb, but he's not sure what he'll drive or who's going to pay for it.

We have a couple of choices on cars," Unser said Tuesday from his New Mexico home, "but they depend on the sponsorship."

As the June 29 race approaches, Unser said he is looking for potential sponsors to step forward.

In his decade of competition at Pikes Peak, Unser, son of racing legend Bobby Unser Sr., has won eight division titles and the overall title in 1992.

His 1994 time of 10 minutes, 5.85 seconds in an open wheel racer is the third-fastest time ever recorded at Pikes Peak.

He last raced at Pikes Peak in 1997. He won hill climb titles in the nowdefunct Open Rally class in 1987 and 1989.

Unser said he wants to compete exclusively in the Sports Car Club of America's ProRally division at Pikes Peak, hoping the exposure will lead to a permanent spot on the ProRally or WorldRally circuit.

The hill climb is run on a 12.42-mile stretch of the highway on the 14,110foot-high mountain. The highway is surrounded by the Pike National Forwildfire burning west of Colorado Springs.

The Associated Press DENVER — Brian Griese complained that he had no one to give the ball to after injuries left the Denver Broncos thin at wide receiver and running back last season.

After a couple of key additions and some improving health, Griese is all smiles.

"It's been really nice," Griese said Tuesday on the second day of Denver's mini camp. "I feel like a kid in a candy store again."

Last season, Denver lost wideout Ed McCaffrey to a broken leg in the season opener against the Giants, then running back Terrell Davis suffered a knee injury that limited his playing time the rest of the season. Running back Olandis Gary also went down with a broken leg in November and wide receiver Rod Smith played most

of the season with an injured ankle. But this season, barring another string of injuries, the Broncos are primed to be one of the deepest offensive teams in the league.

McCaffrey has yet to run patterns against coverage, but has been running and cutting hard during other drills. Davis had arthroscopic surgery to clean out his knee two weeks ago, but has been running on the side and is expected to be back in time for trainno effects of their injuries during mini camp.

offseason to improve their depth in case someone does get hurt.

In April, Denver signed tight end Shannon Sharpe, who helped the Broncos win two Super Bowls, and twotime Pro Bowl receiver Rob Moore. The Broncos also used their first pick in the NFL draft — 19th overall — to select speedy receiver Ashley Lelie.


"It's been real nice to have Eddie, Rod and Shannon in the huddle at one time and think about the possibilities," Griese said.
