How much should loss of adult child hurt?

Dear Plain Sense: It has been five years since my son was killed in an accident.

Friends and relatives keep telling me to stop crying and get on with life. Because my son was a grown adult, with wife and children, these people seem to think my grief shouldn’t be so intense. Are they right?

It is obvious to most people that the pain of losing a young child is a very intense feeling.

We mourn their innocence, their short time in our lives and the void that is left behind.

The loss of an adult child is no less painful. As parents, we believe that our children will be part of our life for the

of friendship and sharing. In addition, parents expect their children to continue the family lineage, traditions and values and sometimes even the family home and/or business.

The loss of an adult child is very painful, and the support of family and friends helps in successfully moving through the stages of grieving.

In time, the pain lessens and fades, but the feelings and memories will always be a part of your life. Find someone to talk with who can help you through the grieving process.

Friends and relatives do not always know what to say or how to say it. There are support groups available, as well as clergy and mental health professionals who have experience in helping people through such difficult times.

School board hires new teachers, talks about grants

The Goodland School Board hired three new teachers at a meeting on Monday and discussed projects it wants the recently-hired grant writer to find money to complete.

Members hired Tanya Gray as a junior high math teacher, Jennifer Gier as a high school science teacher and James Nelson as a high school social studies teacher. They also accepted a resignation from Carol Stewart, the North Elementary School secretary.

Candidate chooses chairs for campaign

Kansas State Treasurer Tim Schallenburg, Republican candidate for governor, appointed Ben Duell and Ron Schilling, both Goodland School Board members, as his Sherman County campaign co-chairs.

Schallenburg called his campaign organization the largest and best organized of the gubernatorial campaigns.

“Having run a statewide campaign for Kansas State Treasurer, I know full well the importance of having a well-organized, committed team on the ground in all 105 counties in Kansas,” he said.

Superintendent Marvin Selby said Schyler Goodwin, a member of the board that runs the new city, county, school grant writer program, is asking all three entities to each come up with lists of projects they want the grant writer to focus on.

Board members said a new roof on the high school, technology upgrades and heating and air conditioning systems for schools should be included on the list. Selby said he will come up with other important projects.

Selby and board members discussed how the program will be run. Selby

said the \$12,000 the district is contributing will be paid in monthly increments, which will have to be included in next year’s budget. The city and county also pitched in \$12,000 each.

Selby said he hopes the board has input on how the money is spent and can meet with the grant writer at some point.

In other business, the board:
• Heard a report from Superintendent Selby, who said the annual summer painting and remodeling projects are going well. He also said the fuel tanks the district bought for the bus

barn have been installed and workers are putting up posts around the above-ground tanks to protect them.

• Agreed to hold their first meeting of the new fiscal year — during which they reorganize for the year — at 5:30 p.m. on Tuesday, July 2 at the administration office on Main Avenue.
