Rockies lose lead in ninth inning

Colorado was ahead by a run entering the ninth. Then Jeff Kent hit a threerun homer off Rockies closer Jose Jimenez in an 8-6 victory for the San Francisco Giants on Monday night.

It was the first time in 35 games Colorado lost when leading after eight innings and the third blown save in 24 chances for Jimenez.
