Teens borrowing car is inevitable

As the parent of two kids, I knew that sooner or later the inevitable would happen — "Mom, can I borrow the car?"

Well, it has happened. It just seemed it would be much later. My son has been driving for about a couple of years and my daughter has just completed her driver's education along with some of her classmates.

Now, do teens drive the way they were taught in class? For the most part they do, but on occasion kids do just the opposite.

As parents, it's our responsibility to make sure and find out if our kids are not being responsible. Vehicles are not toys to show off with; they are large machines which require careful handling. One wrong move could cause a serious accident or even a fatal one.

As your teen begins to drive, you begin to worry. It's not without reason.

Traffic crashes continue to be the leading cause of death among teens. The following information was developed by the Kansas Drunk Driving Prevention Project to provide information about teen driving laws and about alcohol and driving so that parents can discuss their concerns with their children.

In a 1999 survey, funded by the Kansas Department of Transportation, facts about parents of teens and alcohol use came to light.

Thirty-two percent of high school freshmen report that their parents knowingly allowed them to attend a

party where alcohol was served, and 58 percent of high school seniors report that their parents knowingly allowed them to attend a party where alcohol was served.

When parents "bargain" with their teen — allowing their kid to drink if they promise not to drink and drive — the chance the teen will drink and drive actually goes up.

Open the lines of communication about underage drinking and the serious responsibilities of becoming a young driver. Start now, as they are learning to drive, and continue throughout their high school years.

Set some rules for your new driver. • Supervise your teens' driving time. Spend lots of time in the car with your teen behind the wheel — not only for the required 50 supervised hours, but also throughout the first year of driving.

• Prohibit driving or riding with others under the influence of drugs or alcohol.

• Establish and enforce a house curfew, a time by which your teen must be home. • Limit the number of passengers in

the car — more friends mean more distractions.

• Require safety belt use for your teen and all passengers.

• Limit your teens' driving during high risk times. Most crashes occur on Friday and Saturday nights and early Saturday and Sunday mornings.

• Consider requiring your teen to contribute to the cost of the family car. Research shows that teens who pay for a portion of the insurance and maintenance of the car are more likely to be safe drivers.

• Be a good role model.

Facts about teenagers and alcohol: • 48.4 percent of Kansas high school students report that they sometimes drink alcohol.

• 82.5 percent report that they have discussed alcohol-related issues with their parents a few times.

• 58 percent report that in the last month they attended a party where alcohol was served.

• 77 percent report that in the last month they haven't driven while or soon after drinking alcohol.

• 61.4 percent report that in the last month they never drove with a drinking driver.
