



He preceded her in death in 1945. She

married Howard C. Wilson in 1948.

and he preceded her in death in 1991. She had lived in Shawnee for two years. Before that, she lived in Hutchinson for one year, in Derby for seven years, and in Sharon Springs for over 40 years.

She graduated from the University of California at Los Angeles in 1939 with a degree in elementary education. She earned a master's degree in elementary education from Fort Hays State University in 1977. She taught pre-school, kindergarten

and second grade for many years in both California and in Sharon Springs. She was the first to teach children with learning disabilities in Wallace County. She and her sisters enjoyed genealogy and traced many branches of the Record family tree back to before the

Revolutionary War including some ancestors from the Mayflower. She documented this family history in several books. She also helped to write and produce the book, "The History of Wallace County."

She and Howard enjoyed traveling. and they visited countries in nearly every continent over the years and made one trip around the world.

She took her children and grandchildren on many of her trips in the last 15 years, including a millennium cruise to the western Caribbean. She accompanied her husband to

Springs United Methodist Church. Daughters of the American Revolution, the Mayflower Descendants, American Association of University Women and P.E.O Sisterhood.
