explored the vast wastes at the bottom of the world. He participated in the construction of Admiral Byrd's Little America IV research station, and a year later, returned as staff construction officer for Operation Windmill. Because of his role in a mapping expedition along the Antarctic's Knox Coast, Mallory Point was named for him by Admiral Byrd.

In 1950, he earned his master's degree in civil engineering from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, Troy, NY. While attending college there he met his wife, Anne Veronica Duffey. They were married on July 8, 1950. They had one son, Michael Joseph, born March 5, 1954. In 1965, the family moved to Severna Park, MD., where he lived at the time of his death. During the 1950's, as a member of Adm. Hyman Rickover's staff, he worked on the development of nuclear power plants for submarines. He later served as the project officer for the nuclear propulsion system for the USS Triton, a submarine. Mr. Mallory returned to the Antarctic in 1962 and 1963, overseeing the construction of the nuclear power plant at McMurdo Station. He retired from the Navy's Civil Engineering Corps with the rank of Commander in 1965. At the time of his retirement, he was presented the secretary of the Navy's Commendation Medal for his work developing nuclear power plants for remote military installations.

In 1965, he went to work for Hittman Corp. in Columbia, MD., as manager of nuclear and environmental engineering. Promoted to vice-president in 1970, his engineering interests expanded to include the field of radioactive waste disposal. He remained with the company after its purchase by Westinghouse Electric Corp., in 1982, as senior technical adviser until retiring in 1988. Mr. Mallory wrote widely in his field and was the author of more than 30 technical papers. He held a number of U.S. and foreign patents.

As an avid golfer, he was an active member and past president of the Chatwell Country Club. He also enjoyed photography and watched all sports, attending many of the Baltimore Colt and Washington Redskin games. Mr. Mallory was an active communicant of St. John the Evangelist Roman Catholic Church, Severna Park, MD, where a Mass of Christian burial was offered on July 13. Interment with full military honors will be held at 12:30 p.m. August 9, 2002, at Arlington National Cemetery in Virginia.

He was preceded in death by his parents and a sister, Elma Louise. He is survived by his wife, Anne, of Severna Park; his son, Mike, and his wife, Georgia, and his grandson, Michael, and granddaughter, Georgia, all of Baltimore, MD.; his two sisters, Nadine Kammer and Bonnie Reid, of Brewster, KS.

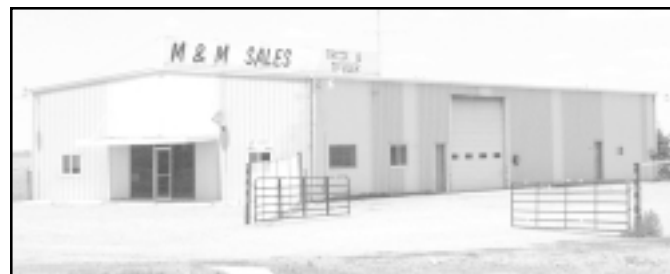

Charles William (Bill) Mallory, who accompanied Adm. Richard E. Byrd on his last Antarctic expedition and later retired as senior technical advisor to Westinghouse Electric Corp., died of leukemia at the North Arundel Hospital in Glen Burnie, MD, on July 6, 2002. He was 76 years old. Mr. Mallory was born September 17, 1925, on the family farm northeast of Brewster KS. His parents were Lloyd and Lina (Andregg) Mallory. After graduation from High School in 1943, he began his college studies at Kansas State College in Manhattan. In 1944, he enlisted in the Navy and was assigned to the ROTC program at the University of Colorado, where he earned a bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering. As a newly commissioned ensign, he joined Admiral Byrd's final Antarctic expedition in 1946. During the three-month tour to the Antarctic that extended into 1947, Mr. Mallory was a member of a 4,000-man team that conducted scientific experiments and
