## Colorado gets one hit against Cubs

CHICAGO (AP) — Mark Prior was as surprised as anybody when he found out that he was going to get a chance to pitch his first career complete game.

Prior had a career-high 13 strikeouts, pitching a five-hitter to lead the Chicago Cubs to a 4-1 victory over the Colorado Rockies on Sunday.

With his pitch count already at 120 after eight innings, Prior got the call to finish the game.

"I was kind of surprised that they did send me out there," Prior said. "You got to do it sometime and get the feel what it's like to close a game out."

Prior, in his 14th career start, took a shutout into the eighth inning. The 21year-old right-hander walked two and finished the game by striking out Jack Cust for the third time on his 136th pitch of the game.

"He was on his last hitter," Cubs interim manager Bruce Kimm said. "Really I didn't want him to go over 130. He was throwing very well and I just wanted to see him close it out himself." Prior (5-3) retired 13 of the first 14
