

The Sherman County Conservation District will conduct a sign up August 15th through August 29th for both **Non-Point and State Water Resources Cost Share Programs.** Some of the State Water Resources Cost Share Program practices eligible for cost

share include Contour Buffer Strips, Critical Area Planting, Diversions, Fencing, Grassed Waterways, Pipelines, Terraces and Livestock Wells. The Irrigation Practices will include Subsurface drip, Irrigation Water Conveyance, Irrigation Water Management and Irrigation System, Sprinkler. Cost Share is NOT authorized for nozzle upgrades (example 9 to 2 ft.) Exceptions shall be allowed for spacing modification (example 10 to 7.5 It or 5 ft or less) if NRCS determines significant efficiency gains will be achieved. Non metered systems and systems with end guns will incur a state cost share limit of 50% or less up to landowner limit of \$1500. All other irrigation practices will be cost shared at 50% not to exceed \$2500. You will need a bid from an irrigation dealer to apply and you will be required to provide water right information. The other non irrigation practices will be cost shared at 60% of average cost or actual cost whichever is less with a \$5000 landowner limit.

The Non Point Source Funds can be used for FAILING on site waste water systems and plugging abandoned wells. We only received \$7000.00. KDHE will have to evaluate and rank the applications and there will be a \$50 fee upfront for these services. Last year we were only able to fund three systems.
