Girl wins fifth place at nationals

The Goodland Daily News Months of summer practice paid off for a Goodland girl last week when she placed fifth and ninth in a national track and field tournament.

Michelle Smith went to Nashville, Tenn., for the National Amateur Athletic Union track meet, in which she placed fifth in the discus throw and ninth in the shot put.

This was the first year Smith said she was eligible for discus, but she placed ninth in the shot put last year.

The 10-year-old practiced almost every day this summer, starting in April, getting ready for the track season. She competed first in Oakley and Hays meets, and from there went on to state, bi-state, regional and national tournaments.

She threw the discus 62 feet 10 inches and the shot put 25-11. She got three throws in each event, and the top eight competitors got a chance for three more throws. She was three inches short of qualifying for the final round in the shot put, she said.

There were 30 girls each event in Michelle's age division, said Sondra Smith, Michelle's mother, and more than 13,000 people in all events.

"We were surprised when she qualified in the top eight in the discus," Sondra said. "When she got fifth, we were really excited."

Smith placed second in the two events at the regional meet in Columbia, Mo., and placed second or better at every meet this year.

She had never been to Tennessee before, Smith said, and enjoyed the two day drive, except the view was a little obstructed.

"There were too many trees," she said. "It got annoying."

Smith went to the tournament with her mother and grandparents, Russell and Mary Ann Briney, and they took the long way home, visiting the home of Andrew Jackson outside of Nashville and Laura Ingalls Wilder, author of "Little House on the Prairie", in Missouri. In Nashville, they got a little lost and kept going in circles.

"We saw the stadium of the Tennessee Titans from just about every angle," Smith said.

The two medals will go into a collection Smith has gathered over the past two years, and she said her dad has promised to build a shelf for them.

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP)—Three hits, including a home run, were not enough to keep Carlos Febles in the majors.

Febles went 3-for-4 Sunday with his first home run since July 4 as the Kansas City Royals topped the Tampa Bay Devil Rays 10-0.

After the game, the Royals optioned Febles to Triple-A Omaha.

"What can I say?" Febles said. "I can't feel good about it. Whatever they want to do they can do.' Febles is hitting just .233 with 23

extra-base hits in 318 at-bats this year. He hit .236 in 79 games last season. "I know I can do better than that, no

doubt," Febles said. "When you're not doing what they want you to do, stuff happens."

Febles has been the Royals' primary second baseman since 1999, but had been hurt by injuries. He missed 44 games last year with a ligament tear in his right knee and started only 93 games in 2000 when he had two stints

Rockies lose to Chicago

DENVER (AP)—After hitting four homers and driving in 14 runs in just two games at Coors Field over the weekend, Sammy Sosa was asked what his numbers might be if he played 81 games a season in the hitter-friendly park.

"I don't know," Sosa said following the Cubs' 12-9 win over the Colorado Rockies on Sunday. "I belong to Chicago."

For now, anyway. Sosa said he will consider moving on if he has to endure another losing season with the Cubs in 2003. He hit his 600th career home run Saturday.

The Rockies would just as soon Sosa moves on — and out of the National League.

Sosa hit a grand slam and drove in five runs in Sunday's win. Coupled with his nine RBIs on a trio of threerun homers Saturday night, he set an NL record for RBIs in consecutive games with 14.

"A lot of Sammy over the weekend," Rockies manager Clint Hurdle said, shaking his head.

In the three-game series, Sosa went 8-for-12.

Sosa's grand slam came off Justin Speier in the seventh inning.

Off the field, Sosa has sounded off about his frustration playing for a losing franchise and his intention not to fly on the team's charter plane, which he contends is unsafe.

Sosa planned to charter his own private plane for the trip to Chicago on Sunday night, as he did for the trip from San Francisco to Denver on Thursday night.

He wouldn't confirm those plans after the game, however.

Corey Patterson hit two homers and drove in three runs. Fred McGriff hit a two-run homer and also had three RBIs.

The slam, a 435-foot shot to center, gave the Cubs an 11-3 lead.

Evewitnesses say fans threw punches at each other, and one man reportedly held a man down and repeatedly pummeled him for the ball.

Broncos' running back gets left knee examined

GREELEY, Colo. (AP) - Injuryplagued running back Terrell Davis had an MRI exam on his swollen left knee Sunday after he missed the Denver Broncos' preseason opener the day before.

Results were not expected until Monday, and coach Mike Shanahan said he didn't know the severity of the injury.

"I have to talk to the doctors," Shanahan said. "I've got find out where the knee is, what they think, what happened, why his leg was sore, why he couldn't go, take a look at the MRI. I've got to get a number of ques-



tions answered before I can answer you guys."

Davis, who's struggled with knee injuries the past three seasons, was scheduled to start against Chicago on Saturday, but pulled himself out just before the game because of swelling in the knee.

He also had the knee drained of fluid

earlier in the week

"What I'm saying is, I don't know," Davis said after the game. "I'm taking cartilage fibers and scar tissue from a wait and see attitude at this time. I feel pretty upbeat. I don't like having setbacks like this. It tends to throw me off track.'

Davis, the league's MVP in 1998 after rushing for 2,008 yards, tore the anterior cruciate ligament in his right knee in the fourth game of the 1999 season

He played just four games the next year with left foot and ankle injuries, and played just eight last season after having arthroscopic surgery on both


Davis had surgery to remove loose under his left kneecap in May, but was back on the field for a minicamp three weeks later. He had been practicing just once a day during training camp, but was running hard and seemed to be without pain.

"The weird thing about it is that it's supposed to be my pristine knee, the knee that didn't really have any problems," Davis said. "I really don't know. I'm sitting over there like, 'what's going on?' I guess we'll see what direction we're going to head in."
