Bernie Williams' RBI single lifted the New York to a 3-2 victory Wednesday night, but more remarkable was the unlikely steal of home by Kansas City's Mike Sweeney.

Hardly known for his speed on the bases, Sweeney had five steals in 10 attempts all season and 35 for his career. This was his second game back after missing a month because of back and hip injuries, and the first baseman was being used as the designated hit-

Moved to third on Joe Randa's sacrifice bunt, Sweeney told third-base coach Richie Dauer he believed he could steal against Yankees left-hander Andy Pettitte with the score tied at 1 and two out.

"I made eye contact with (manager) Tony Pena and he gave me a nod," Sweeney said. "I thought he told me to go ahead. I later found out he was telling me be ready for a ball in the dirt."

Sweeney said he had been watching the way Pettitte prepared for his


