

# College gets \$1 million donation

TOPEKA (AP) — An anonymous donor has given \$1 million to help build a new football stadium at Washburn University, president Jerry Farley said.

The donation brings the stadium's fund-raising campaign close enough to its goal to proceed with the work, Farley announced Sunday at the annual Icabod Club kickoff.

Farley declined to say anything more about the donor, except that the money came from an individual, not a corporation.

The new stadium is expected to cost \$4.35 million. The Washburn Board of Regents is expected to approve a bid for construction at its September meeting.

Construction would then begin after the Icabods' last home game on Nov. 2 and be ready for the start of the 2003 football season.

Farley said the donor will be allowed to make a recommendation for a name for the stadium, but the name will be selected by the regents.

The campaign also received a \$500,000 gift last year from Bernie Bianchino, an Overland Park businessman who played football at Washburn. The university will put up another \$2 million.

The fund-raising campaign hopes to ultimately raise \$6 million, with some money going to improve other athletic programs at the school.

The current stadium was built in 1928 and has had only minor renovations since then.

The most noticeable feature of the new stadium will be a three-story structure on the west side.

The top floor will house a media box, with eight suites on the middle floor and a concourse with theater seating on the lower level.

# Norton team wins tournament

The four-time winners of the KKCI-KLOE-KWGB Classic Golf Tournament were forced to step aside for a new champion Sunday at Sugar Hills Golf Club.

A 10-man team from Norton slipped into the first slot with a score of 770 by just two strokes. Colby, which was looking for a fifth victory in a row, had to settle for sharing second with Goodland and Atwood, all of them shooting a 772.

"It's amazing," said Kay Melia, tournament director. "It is almost unbelievable that with all these golfers out there they would finish that close together."

The best individual golfer at the tournament was Lonnie Melvin of Colby, who shot 67 on the par-71 course. Dax Hayden of Goodland finished second with a 68. Last year, the three best golfers tied at 71.

Joe Herman was the hero of the Norton team, coming in with a score of 72 to cinch his team's victory. "We had some good golfers out there," Melia said.

"These guys shot a good game." There were 12 teams on the links this year, the most in the tournaments 13-year history, Melia said.

Each represented an area golf club, Melia said, and about \$5,000 in prize money was split among the top teams.

Goodland players which shot under 80 included Curt Minner, 72; Jon McLean, Chuck Osborn and Tyson Shelley, 77; Travis Jones, 78; and Steve Rayer, 79. Other players included Seth Hayden, Tim Livengood, Warren Sweat and Kevin Sanderson.

Burlington came in fourth with a score of 799. Hoxie shot 815, Sharon Springs 828, Tribune, 830, Oakley 836, St. Francis 842, Benkelman, Neb., 862, and Oberlin 867.

"All in all, I'd say it was a good tournament," Melia said. "We had a lot of people competing, and we had a lot of fun."

# Home runs lift Braves to victory

ATLANTA — If this was the final home game of the season, the Atlanta Braves made it one to remember.

After a sloppy, lethargic performance most of the day, Gary Sheffield and Chipper Jones hit back-to-back homers leading off the ninth for a stunning 7-6 victory over the Colorado Rockies on Monday.

Jones also homered in the eighth, sparking a three-run outburst that tied the game 5-4. Colorado went back ahead in the ninth against John Smoltz, only to watch the game slip away on a couple of swings.

"Better late than never," Jones said. "It was good to battle back. We had really gotten outplayed this series."

The Braves, who start a 12-game road trip Tuesday with the best record in baseball, played their final game at Turner Field before the Aug. 30 strike date.

Jones and his teammates hope a walkout can be avoided.

"That would be very disappointing," he said. "This is the best team I've ever played for, and I'm sure most of the guys in here feel the same way. We want to keep it going."

The Rockies had won the previous two games at Turner Field but couldn't finish off the four-game series with another victory. The split means Atlanta has still lost only one series since early May.

After squandering their three-run lead, the Rockies went back ahead 6-5 in the ninth. Greg Norton hit a two-out, run-scoring double off Smoltz (3-2).

But Colorado closer Jose Jimenez (2-8) needed only seven pitches to blow the game. Sheffield drove a 404-foot shot into the left-center bleachers for his 22nd homer, then Jones hit the game-winner, a 406-footer to right for his 19th homer.

"This should have been a loss," Jones said. "Through seven innings, they beat us in all three aspects of the game. We got outhit, outpitched and outdefended."

The Rockies' bullpen dropped to 12-21 with a 4.49 ERA for the season, ruining a strong effort by Mike Hampton. The Rockies starter worked 6 2-3 innings, hit a run-scoring double and left

with a 5-2 lead.

"There were a lot of pluses," manager Clint Hurdle said. "We came back and made a run against the greatest closer in the game."

After Jones' first homer, the Braves took advantage of an error by second baseman Terry Shumpert. Javy Lopez followed with a double off the glove of third baseman Brent Butler and Marcus Giles tied it with a two-run single.

Sheffield, whose wife is expecting

their first child at any moment, struck out with two runners on to end the seventh. He got the Braves rolling in the ninth.

"My mind was so much on my wife," he said. "I was kind of drifting out there. I had to really focus."

Atlanta starter Tom Glavine gave up five runs in seven innings, but only three were earned. The defense let him down with a couple of errors in the third — one after Glavine's pickoff move caught a Rockies player in a rundown.

# Broncos give 49ers first preseason win

DENVER — Terrell Davis came out of the tunnel before Denver's exhibition game against the San Francisco 49ers knowing it would likely be the final time he stepped onto the field in a Broncos uniform.

The near-capacity crowd of 69,343 at Invesco Field at Mile High knew it, too. And the raucous cheers let Davis know that the Broncos fans were going to miss him.

Once the game got started, Terrell Owens had seven catches for 123 yards, and San Francisco held Denver to 242 total yards to win 12-7, the first in three preseason games. The 49ers scored on four field goals, three by Jose Cortez.

Denver (1-1) moved 80 yards for a touchdown on its second drive, but crossed the 50-yard line four times the rest of the way.

"I liked the way we played in the first half," Mariucci said. "Our defense gave up one long drive and score, but other than that we played well."

Rookie Clinton Portis showed signs that he might be ready to take over for Davis.

Portis, the Broncos' second-round draft pick, had 45 yards on Denver's first scoring drive and capped it with a 1-yard dive over the right side. He had eight carries and caught a 5-yard pass during the 12-play drive.

Portis finished with 43 yards on 11 carries after getting 57 yards against Chicago last week.

"As everyone can see, he has great running skills," Denver coach Mike Shanahan said. "He made a number of big plays and I was impressed with him."

Owens, coming off his second straight Pro Bowl season, showed off his playmaking abilities in the first half before sitting out the second. He made would-be tacklers miss and got a good chunk of his yardage after the catch.

Owens caught a 48-yard pass from Jeff Garcia to set up San Francisco's first score, a 27-yard field goal by Cortez in the first quarter, and zig-zagged his way through Denver's defense for a 16-yard gain in the second.

"I am just trying to work on my game and definitely be more patient on my routes," Owens said. "Those are the type of things I work on in practice and I try to carry it over to the game."

Ashley Lelie, Denver's first-round pick, was also sharp.

Lelie, who started in place of injured receivers Rod Smith and Ed McCaffrey, caught five passes for 56 yards.

He adjusted to catch a pass thrown behind him for a 13-yard gain in the first quarter, and had a tough fingertip grab for 12 yards in the second.

Garcia played the first half after playing just two series the previous game. He was 11-of-18 for 149 yards.

Tim Rattay, battling Brandon Doman for the backup spot, took all the snaps in the second half and completed his final nine passes to finish 9-of-10 for 91 yards.

# Davis says goodbye

DENVER (AP) — Bad knees did what opponents never could: stop Terrell Davis.

To a standing ovation, he gave a mile-high salute to the fans and was hugged by his teammates, exchanging a long embrace with tight end Shannon Sharpe.

After walking to midfield as the lone Broncos player at the coin toss, Davis retreated to the sideline. He spent the second half in street clothes.

On Tuesday, the Broncos, at Davis' request, will place him on injured reserve, ending his season and effectively ending the career of a player who was both a Super Bowl and regular-season MVP.

Davis' farewell was an emotional event.

"I have mixed feelings," he said. "It's tough. My mind tells me one thing, my knees say something else."

"When I put the uniform on before the game, it was almost like I was getting ready to go play. I had to remind myself that I wasn't going to play. It

was a little difficult."

A succession of knee injuries and surgeries since 1999 — along with degenerative arthritis in both joints — made Davis' decision inevitable.

The final straw came last week. Hopeful of a return to good health in 2002 after playing in only 17 games the previous three seasons, Davis was unable to play in the Broncos' opening exhibition game on Aug. 10, when he experienced pain and swelling in his left knee.

Two days later, doctors drained bloody fluid from the knee, not the clear liquid Davis was expecting to see.

The 29-year-old Davis refused to close the door completely on a return to football, but said it likely would take a medical miracle.
