Rumpel said the citizens presented a petition in September 1982, and it was approved by the voters in November to allow an annual tax of no more than one mill to fund the service program for the elderly, estimated to be \$57,932. This can be combined with revenues from other sources. The requested total for next year is \$63,579,

"I will be talking to the commissioners individually today to see if they feel the new figures are on the right track," Rumpel said.

She thought the new figures would bring the tax levy down to around 50 mills. This would mean there would still be a tax increase from last year, and Rumpel told the commissioners they may need to think about not giving a three percent raise or possibly any raises if they want to avoid a tax increase this year.

'There is a problem with holding the level down too far, because you then find yourself in a catch-up situation similar to what the state is facing," Rumpel said.
