# Sharon says deal with Arafat may be possible

JERUSALEM—Israeli Prime Minister Ariel Sharon says that for the first time in nearly two years of fighting, he sees the possibility of a negotiated deal with the Palestinians because many of them are souring on violence.

Sharon's statement came just hours after Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat accused Israel of crimes against humanity for expelling two people from the West Bank to Gaza on Wednesday. The two are relatives of a Palestinian explosives expert accused by Israel of sending suicide bombers into Tel Aviv.

Today, police said they discovered a car bomb containing 1,350 pounds of explosives — one of the biggest ever — that had been brought into northern Israel from the West Bank. The car bomb was detonated in an open space and no injuries were reported.

David Baker, an official at the prime minister's office, said the car bombing was probably planned to coincide with teeming cities.

Sharon has ruled out talks with Arafat, charging that he has encouraged militants to attack Israel. However, Sharon said he could talk to "Palestinians who have reached the conclusion that by terrorism nothing can be achieved.'

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan — President Gen. Pervez Musharraf says there's no need for U.S. troops to pursue al-Qaida and Taliban fugitives into Pakistan because the Pakistani army can handle them.

Musharraf acknowledged in an interview with The Associated Press that nation's newest pop star Wednesday on there were "pockets" of al-Qaida elements not only along the border with Afghanistan but also in Pakistan's

"But we are searching and combing the area," he said Wednesday. He added that Osama bin Laden's al-Qaida movement had established links with Pakistani extremist groups.

LOS ANGELES — Dozens of buildings were in ruins as two Southern California wildfires burned across 20,000 acres, and authorities closely watched major power lines near one of the blazes.

Hundreds of residents and campers were forced to flee.

Rugged canyons and ridges, tinderdry chaparral and windy weather with temperatures above 100 frustrated efforts to control the blazes and both remained out of control Wednesday.

A new count showed a fire in the Angeles National Forest above Azusa destroyed 72 buildings, including 50 vacation cabins and a century-old ranger station, U.S. Forest Service spokesman Ed Gilliland said Wednes-

The 15,800-acre fire 30 miles northeast of downtown Los Angeles had shut down two main power lines and California's power grid managers were nouncing the decision.

tions about aging in 1975, and then examined how their responses predicted their survival up to 23 years

The study, published in the Journal of Personality and Social Psychology, was financed by the National Institute Researchers found respondents with

more positive views on aging live longer, even after taking into account factors such as age, gender, socio-economic status, functional health, selfreported health and loneliness. "The median survival of those in the

more positive self perceptions of aging group was seven and a half years longer than those in the more negative percepions," Kunkel said.

The attitudes on aging had a greater impact on life span than lower body mass index, not smoking and regular exercise — each of which extends life by one to three years.

"Our study carries two messages," said Dr. Becca Levy, a researcher at

author. "The discouraging one is that fected when elderly persons are exnegative self perceptions can diminish life expectancy; the encouraging one is that positive self-perceptions can prolong life expectancy."

But Richard Suzman, associate director for behavioral and social research for the National Institute on Aging, said while a positive self perception helps, it should not replace living right — or encourage anyone to keep smoking.

"Any notion that positive thinking is more powerful than not smoking ... there just isn't evidence of that," he said. "There is enormous clinical evidence to show the value of not smoking and exercising.'

The researchers found that the will to live accounts for some of the relationship between positive self perceptions of aging and survival, but does not completely account for difference in longevity.

Department of Epidemiology and Public Health has shown cardiovascular

posed to negative stereotypes of aging.

The new study said stereotypes about aging are acquired decades before the person becomes old and are therefore rarely questioned.

"Once individuals become older. they may lack the defenses of other groups to ward off the impact of negative stereotypes on self perceptions,' the report said.

Kunkel said the study offers a strong message about life.

"There is nothing we can do about aging," she said. "It's like sitting in traffic when you're late. The natural response is to get very stressed about the situation. The other choice is to not get upset and think about how to deal with the consequences of being late."

The key is learning how to see a situation for what it is, she said, and to give it no more power than it needs to have.

"We enter later adulthood with our Levy's earlier research at Yale's habitual ways of dealing with stress,' she added. "People need to learn new strategies to deal with it."




