

# Cowgirl golfers win first tourney

The Cowgirl golf team walked away with first place among larger schools at the invitational tournament in WaKeeney on Thursday, with one golfer bringing home the second place medal and another placing fifth.

It was the Cowgirls' first tournament of the season, and Coach Connie Livengood said it was a great start.

With 197 strokes, Goodland placed first in Division 1, competing against larger schools including Colby, 223, third; Hays, 213, second; Dodge City, 255; Scott City, 240; Garden City, 239; and Ulysses, 259.

The Cowgirls had fewer strokes than any other team at the tournament.

In Division 2, Lakin took first place with 199 strokes; Holcomb, second, 208; Trego, third, 222; Sublette, 253; Lacrosse, 245; and Thomas More Prep, which didn't have a team score because only three of its golfers competed.

Before the tournament, Coach

Livengood said the top three golf teams in the state are Lakin, Ulysses and Syracuse. She said the Cowgirls' goal is to be better than these teams, and they outplayed both Ulysses and Lakin this week.

The Cowgirls did well both as a team and individually.

Jessica Osborn and Kendra Billinger, who both qualified for the state tournament last year, placed in the top five, with Osborn taking second with 43 strokes and Billinger fifth with 47 for nine holes.

Kayla Crone, Lakin, took the top spot with 42 strokes; Michelle Ridgway, Lakin, shot 44; Milissa Brown, Sublette, 46; Jordan Lofink, Holcomb, 47; Sara Novack, Colby, 49; Carmen Chan, Thomas More, 49; Kelli Caspers, Hays, 49; and Crystal Geist, Trego, 50.

Scores for other Goodland golfers were Kayla Rasure, 51; Andrea Fenner, 56; Bailee Guyer, 62; Ana McClung, 67; and Amy Cebula, 60.

# Cowboys face Hoxie tonight

# Kansas coach trying to improve entire team

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — A 45-3 clobbering at Iowa State in his head coaching debut enabled Mark Mangino to identify where Kansas needs to improve.

"There isn't an area of our team that we don't need to improve in, offensively, defensively and in the kicking game," Mangino said. "We studied the game tape of week one very carefully, as a staff and with our players. We realize that we have a lot of things that

we need to get done and to improve upon."

It would help if the Jayhawks could stay home for game No. 2 of the Mangino era. But the schedule calls for a trip to Las Vegas to take on a UNLV team coming off one of the weirdest endings ever witnessed to a college football game.

The Rebels (0-1) opened their season at home last week before the largest crowd (42,075) ever to watch a

team sports event in Nevada. But play was halted with 7:41 remaining in the fourth quarter when a transformer blew and plunged the stadium into nearly complete darkness.

The result was a 27-7 loss to Wisconsin.

The Jayhawks managed only 150 total yards against Iowa State and have switched quarterbacks, replacing Zach Dyer as starter and giving the nod to junior college transfer Bill

Whittemore. The Rebels will offer another tough test for the Jayhawks' struggling offense.

"UNLV is a very good football team," Mangino said. "They are very strong defensively. I would say that when you look at raw talent, they're as talented and maybe even more talented than Iowa State's defense. They have one of the top defensive ends in the country in Ahmad Briggs."

# Nebraska player claims rumors caused suspension

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — Suspended for the next three games, Nebraska running back Thunder Collins says he believes a former employer's rumors have helped create his latest troubles.

Coach Frank Solich said Wednesday that Collins, who was suspended for last week's game against Troy State, also will not play against Utah State this Saturday, Penn State and Iowa State later this month.

Solich said the suspension was necessary because Collins violated

an NCAA rule, but would not elaborate.

Collins also appeared in court Wednesday because he failed to complete a domestic violence prevention class he agreed to last summer in a case involving his girlfriend.

Two misdemeanor assault charges that had been dismissed have been refiled, and Collins faces an Oct. 28 trial.

Collins said he could not say what caused his suspension.

# Kansas State faces easy game against Louisiana-Monroe

MANHATTAN (AP) — After the embarrassment they suffered the last time they visited Manhattan, it's no wonder they changed their name.

Known as Northeast Louisiana, the Indians suffered a 62-7 clobbering on

a late-September afternoon in 1998.

Now — four years later — the Indians are back, but not as Northeast Louisiana. Now they go by Louisiana-Monroe. But they're still enormous underdogs and probably so outmanned the

rematch won't be any more competitive than the 1998 mismatch.

Of course, leave it to a coach to find something to worry about. The Indians' offense, says Kansas State coach Bill Snyder, "does a lot of things well."

"Formations are the most difficult thing they (have) to defend," he said.

The Wildcats' offense will again be led by senior quarterback Marc Dunn, then by Ell Robertson in the second half.

## ORDINANCE NO. 1489

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GOODLAND, KANSAS, PERTAINING TO SUPPLEMENTARY DISTRICT ZONING REGULATIONS AND R-1 RESIDENTIAL SINGLE FAMILY AND TWO-FAMILY AND R-2 MULTIFAMILY ZONING DISTRICTS AND AMENDING AND REPEALING PARAGRAPH 7D OF ARTICLE 6 OF THE CITY OF GOODLAND ZONING REGULATIONS AND PARAGRAPH 6A OF ARTICLE 4, R-1 AND PARAGRAPH 6A OF ARTICLE 4, R-2 OF THE ZONING REGULATIONS OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF GOODLAND, KANSAS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF CITY OF GOODLAND, KANSAS:

SECTION 1. Article 6, 7D shall read as follows:

No fence except fences erected upon public or parochial school grounds or in public parks, public playgrounds and commercial and industrial zoned districts shall be constructed of a height greater than four (4) feet in the front yard or six (6) feet elsewhere; provided, however, that the Planning Commission may, as a conditional use, authorize the construction of a fence up to eight (8) feet in height if the Planning Commission finds the public welfare is served.

SECTION 2. Article 4, "R-1", 6A shall read as follows:

Front Yard: On a developed block the front yard shall be determined by the established building line and on an undeveloped block 60 feet from the center of the street. (R-1)

SECTION 3. Article 4, "R-2", 6A shall read as follows:

Front Yard: On a developed block the front yard shall be determined by the established building line and on an undeveloped block 60 feet from the center of the street. (R-2)

SECTION 4. Paragraph 7D of Article 6. Paragraph 6A of Article 4, R-1 and Paragraph 6A of Article 4, R-2 of the Zoning Regulations of the Code of the City of Goodland, Kansas are hereby repealed.

## ORDINANCE NO. 1486

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GOODLAND, KANSAS, PERTAINING TO BUILDING PERMIT FEES AND REPEALING AND AMENDING SECTION 4-207(I) OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF GOODLAND, KANSAS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF CITY OF GOODLAND, KANSAS:

SECTION 1. Fees. Building permit fees for new construction shall be based on the annual Building Valuation Data sheet provided in the Building Standards publication, which represents the average cost for most buildings. Building permit fees for remodels will be based on the estimated cost of construction.

(a) Item Fees  
Residential Fences \$15.00  
Residential Roofing \$15.00  
(b) Total Valuation Fees  
\$1.00 to \$500.00 \$15.00

\$501.00 to \$2,000.00 \$15.00 for the first \$500.00 plus \$1.50 for each additional \$100.00 or fraction thereof, up to and including \$2,000.00.

\$2001.00 to \$25,000.00 \$37.50 for the first \$2,000.00 plus \$6.00 for each additional \$1,000.00 or fraction thereof, up to and including \$25,000.00.

\$25,001.00 to \$50,000.00 \$175.50 for the first \$25,000.00 plus \$4.50 for each additional \$1,000.00 or fraction thereof, up to and including \$50,000.00.

\$50,001.00 to \$100,000.00 \$288.00 for the first \$50,000.00 plus \$3.00 for each additional \$1,000.00 or fraction thereof, up to and including \$100,000.00.

\$100,001.00 to \$500,000.00 \$438.00 for the first \$100,000.00 plus \$2.25 for each additional \$1,000.00 or fraction thereof, up to

and including \$500,000.00, \$500,001.00 to \$1,000,000.00 \$1,338.00 for the first \$500,000.00 plus \$1.50 for each additional \$1,000.00 or fraction thereof, up to and including \$1,000,000.00.

\$1,000,001.00 and up \$2,088.00 for the first \$1,000,000.00 plus \$1.50 for each additional \$1,000.00 or fraction thereof,

Any governmental entity which has the authority to levy a tax is exempt from this section,

SECTION 2. Section 4-207(I) of the Code of the City of Goodland, Kansas is hereby repealed.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall be in force and take effect after its publication in the official City's newspaper,
