sports **Cowboys end 12-game losing streak at home**

The Goodland Daily News The Goodland Cowboys didn't just to one by Holcomb. win, they won big.

Six touchdowns, 335 rushing yards and a tough defense gave the Cowboys the 39-0 win Friday night against the Holcomb Longhorns, ending their 12game losing streak dating back to October of 2000.

"It was good to get that monkey off our back," Coach Tony Diehl said. The Cowboys started the game with

a touchdown and never let up. "Two weeks in a row we've taken the opening drive for a touchdown," Diehl said, "and that helped. The kids sensed that we were a better team."

The Cowboys ran the ball effectively, the coach said, and got back to its base defense and basic offense.

"Last week against Hoxie," he said, "we were thinking a lot."

By not over thinking things and focusing on the basics, he said, the Cowboys were able to be more aggressive Friday.

"We had a little trouble on special teams," Diehl said, "but the defense played well and put a lot of pressure on the quarterback.'

The Cowboys had 336 rushing yards in 58 attempts and lost one yard to Holcomb's 26 yards in 24 attempts and 70 yards lost. In total offense, Goodland had 335 yards to Holcomb's -13. Holcomb fared better in passing, but it was nowhere near enough.

The Cowboys had 14 first downs to six by the Longhorns and no fumbles

After winning the coin toss, the Cowboys took the ball first and opened the game with a touchdown by Bobby Miller. Ian Scherling kicked the extra point.

Holcomb began their offense with a penalty that put them at first and 15 and lost yardage on a tackle by Miller and a quarterback sack and ended up at fourth and 27.

After the punt, Goodland took their next drive on the 40 yard line. When the Cowboys were at first and two, a penalty by Holcomb gave them the first down. Miller ran for eight yards on the first down and then ran for the touchdown. Goodland missed the extra point but were up 13-0.

Holcomb gave up the ball on downs on their next drive, and the Cowboys ran for four yards, one yard and the first down but a penalty made it first and 20. Goodland ran for another five yards before the end of the first quarter.

The second quarter started with the crowd yelling at the referees to give the team its yardage back, as they put the ball at the 40 yard line instead of the 45 and had the Cowboys at second and 20 instead of second and 15.

After a conference with the coaches, the error was corrected and the game continued. Three plays later, the Cowboys turned the ball over on downs.
