icides to sell, Slough said. In the production room, the company will put together television ads to put on its cable system.

The switches for the telephone system will be kept in a room with brick walls, Slough said, which the company calls the vault.

Up to 10 people will work at the office, Slough said, and several technicians will be based there.

The company is also building a new office in Colby.

# Killer up for parole hearing again in January

partment of Corrections in Topeka, said in December Schlicher's privileges were taken away for two days. He said the file doesn't show what exactly the inmate did.

Before that, Miskell said, Schlicher was reprimanded and fined \$5 in Oct. 2000 for unauthorized dealing or trading with another inmate.

In the last six years, he said, the prisoner has had a total of six non-violent violations.

Seidel said the board considers seven areas when deciding whether to grant parole including the crime, crimi-

nal history, program participation, parole plan, disciplinary record, comments from victims and the public and prison capacity. Miskell said Schlicher first saw the board in 1995 and has been denied parole three times, the last time in January 2000.

Several people in Sherman County would like to see Schlicher stay behind bars for what he did almost 33 years ago.

Jack Armstrong, the former sheriff who dogged the case for 10 years, said he knows Schlicher well and he doesn't believe the man could be rehabilitated.

"I don't believe he should be let out," he said. "I think he should serve a life

sentence for what he did.

"He's cold-hearted. In my opinion, it meant nothing to him to do what he did."

A jury in Sherman County sentenced Schlicher to life in 1980, but the actual murder happened in Nov. 1970.

Witnesses and law officers testified that Schlicher and two technical college classmates abducted Wallace Patton after robbing a Mobil service station near the east Goodland I-70 exit.

Marvin Dale Seigris, one of the classmates, confessed to the crime 10 years later because he said he wanted protection from Schlicher, who had

broken parole for another crime and moved to Louisiana, where he started a family.

Seigris testified that Schlicher and Charles Kauffman, the third student, shot Patton four times in a field south of the station.

Schlicher was the only one to go to prison. Seigris received immunity and doctors decided that Kauffman was not sane enough to stand trial.

Lawyers and officers involved in the case said all three had a history of mental problems and had spent time in Larned State Hospital, where Kansas houses criminals in need of psychiatric care.

# Scattered violence occurs in Kashmir with voter turn out around the world

SRINAGAR, India — Political attention shifted to the two capital cities of Indian-controlled Kashmir today, as scattered violence continued the day after large numbers of voters turned out for the first round of legislative polls.

Although one civilian was killed and there were a few violent incidents, the voting took place in relative calm Monday.

Today, one person was killed and 15 were wounded when suspected rebels tossed a grenade into a busy market in Anantnag, 40 miles south of Srinagar, the summer capital of Jammu-Kashmir state, police said.

The attackers were apparently targeting a police patrol, a police officer said on condition of anonymity.

Elsewhere in Kashmir, a militant was killed in a gunbattle today between Indian Border Security Force soldiers and rebels in Tral, south of Srinagar, said a BSF spokesman, Tirath Acharya.

The militant belonged to the outlawed Jaish-e-Mohammed outfit, he said.

Suspected rebels also threw a grenade into the office complex of the Congress party in central Srinagar.

Results are expected by Oct. 12, af-

ter the last phase of voting.

BEIJING — Police have arrested a man suspected of putting rat poison in food that state media say killed as many as 49 people in the eastern Chinese city of Nanjing, a police officer said today.

The man was caught early Sunday

aboard a train in Shangqiu, a city about 250 miles northwest of Nanjing, said the officer, reached by telephone at the Shangqiu train station. He would give only his surname, Li.

The poisonings Saturday, traced to a snack shop, sickened as many as 300 people, according to state media.

Authorities have refused to release a death toll.

labor to build the driveway. Commissioner Curtis Hurd said he liked the idea because it would keep people from parking on the street and causing a traffic hazard.

The Kansas State Historical Society has to approve any changes to the property, Pickman said, because the building is listed as an historical landmark. He said he talked to the director of the center, Tina Goodwin, and she said the society would probably approve the addition. The commission approved building the driveway if the society grants permission.

At the end of the meeting, the commission went into a closed session for about 10 minutes, and when they came out they accepted a donation of land from the Henry H. Sandy Trust on the eastern edge of town.

The 14.72 acres east of I-70 exit 19 is to be used to build a historical museum, Pickman said. The city has until the beginning of 2005 to start the project, and until the end of 2007 to finish it, he said. If the deadlines aren't met, the land reverts back to the trust.

"I guess our next step is finding out if anyone wants to build a historical museum," Pickman said.

In other business, the commission:

- Heard Pickman say he had sent a letter to the Kansas Department of Transportation, saying the construction on Cattletrail was not done to specification. Some of the curbs are

allowing rainwater to flow into yards, he said, and the width of the road is four feet narrower than the plans laid out.

"We are anxious to get the road open again," Pickman said, "but these changes were made without consulting us."

- Renewed the home occupation permit of the Four Sisters Bed and Breakfast at 1204 Center. Pickman reported no complaints about the company. The permit was originally designed to be renewed every year, because the business was the first of its kind in Goodland, but the commissioners removed the annual inspection.

- Approved getting a grant from the Federal Aviation Administration for \$105,009, which partly reimburses the city for land bought near Runway 30 at the Goodland Municipal Airport. The city paid \$116,000 for the land.

- Appointed Pickman and City Clerk Mary Volk as voting delegates to the League of Kansas Municipalities annual meeting Tuesday, Oct. 15, in Wichita. Commissioners Chuck Lutters and Hurd were named alternates.

- Heard Hurd thank Mayor Tom Rohr and the rest of the commission for letting him represent the city at the Sept. 11 service at Max Jones Fieldhouse.

- Listened to Ron Harding, president of the Goodland Area of Commerce, ask that streets be blocked off for the Flatlander Fall Festival on Saturday, Sept. 28.

## Candidates want legalization

WICHITA (AP) — Republican Tim Shallenburger and Democrat Kathleen Sebelius both said Monday the state should help undocumented immigrants become legal as soon as possible.

"We are a land of immigrants," Shallenburger told more than 200 people attending a debate between the candidates. "We should have as open borders as we can have and hope that people come to Kansas. We should make them legal when they get here."

Shallenburger, the state treasurer, said this country should provide easy, affordable and reasonably unregulated ways to help illegal aliens become legal.
