sports Wildcats' first test Saturday against USC

MANHATTAN (AP) - How good s Kansas State?

Until late Saturday night when the 25th-ranked Wildcats have finished playing No. 11 USC, there's no way to

The Wildcats, known for loading up with powderpuffs in the pre-conference season, outdid themselves this year by bringing lambs Western Kentucky, Louisiana-Monroe and Eastern Illinois into town for what evolved into a collective 179-16 slaughter.

At no time and in no way was Bill Snyder's team challenged. In most individual matchups, Kansas State's starters would probably have been better tested merely scrimmaging against their own backups.

But all that changes now.

For the first time since Snyder arrived in 1989 and turned the long-woeful Wildcats into winners, they're playing a home game against a ranked opponent that's not in their own conference.

All of a sudden, they'll find themselves standing on the field at KSU Stadium with athletes who run as fast, hit as hard and block and tackle with skill equal to theirs.

Or, in some cases, maybe faster, harder and with greater skill.

So accustomed to pushovers, will the Wildcats (3-0) be suddenly gripped by an identity crisis? Will they know how to react?

very sensitive about their reputation as schoolyard bullies who don't like to pick on people their own size.

"I think our players have a good mindset about who they are, where they are, who they've played, and who they're going to play," said Snyder. "They understand that."

The Wildcats defeated the Trojans at USC 10-6 last year. But they went on to a 6-6 record, their worst since 1992, and the Trojans (2-0) are now in their second season under head coach Pete Carroll. They'll throw a passing attack at the Wildcats led by Carson Palmer, one of the most accomplished quarterbacks in the school's storied history.

Palmer, who has completed more than 72 percent of his passes and thrown for more than 8,000 yards in his career, may not see a quicker cornerback all year than Newman.
